CATTLE.

Increased Proportion of Short Fed Steers, Trade Slow Steady.

The beef trade is not needing any more cattle than are moving this market for fat steers athough at this point there has been no material change in the run of prices compared with the close of last week and for she stock there is a very "good and active tone to trade with a tendency to strength in current prices. With supplies at the leading markets running about the same as last week there is a very good demand for week there is a very good demand for hogs this week that is affording the selling interest somewhat better prices than were prevailing at the close of business last week. 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

"Carrots differ from other vege-

tables in that they contain a large amount of various sugars," he said. "Properly cooked, hey are sweet and pleasant to the taste; they are also carminative—that is, they promote di-

"In its sleep-producing qualities the carrot is closely ailied to the onion, and as a supper dish for insomnia pamended.

"It has also been averred that the carrot is excellent as a nerve tonic and a mental stimulant. There ca be no doubt as to its peculiar prope ties for inducing sleep, but they should not be eaten raw. They are very indigestible uncooked."

A lady who is an enthusiastic vegetarian gave one of the best recipes for cooking this vegetable.

"Carrots are best cooked 'conservatively," she said. "By this I mean they should be cut in strips and allowed to simmer, with butter, in a double cooker. No water should be added.

"By this method all the valuable juices and properties of the carrot are retained instead of being thrown away with the hot water, as is done when they are boiled.

"For supper this dish is most appe tizing-a poached egg is a dainty addition. It is a meal which I know from experience induces slumber.

"The many good qualities of carrots are overlooked by the public. They not only induce sleep, but are excellent for the complexion as a consequence of their tonic effect on the
