IRRIGATION PROJECT \$2,500,000. Cheyenne, Wyo.—Chicago capitalists have contracted with the state through the land board to take over the Oregon Basin project, the largest individual irrigation enterprise in the United States, by which 150,000 acres of fine land in the Big Horn Basin will be reclaimed.

HOTEL TO COST \$2,000,000. Los Angeles, Cal.—Dr. A. G. Schloesser and Chicago capitalists. It is announced will erect a magnificent hotel of 800 rooms at beautiful Hollywood with an outlay of \$2,000,000. The site will comprise eighty-seven acres, known as the Griffith Hill, bought of J. H. Spiers at a valuation of \$500,000.
