than a year ago.

At the start of the week the trade in beef steers ruled sluggish and a decline of 10 to 15 cents was noted on practically all grades of fat steers. The Kansas City post card, to which The Journa has had occasion to refer in several instances of pernicious and misleading activity, is at it again, and in this instance the post card is a LAAR pure and simple. The last issue of the post card gives a report of a shipment of butcher cattle, billed from Hill City, Kansas, through Kansas City to the St. Joseph market. The story of the post card is that the cattle were bid \$4.30 in Kansas City but that the owner was not satisfied with the bld, that he had been told the stock would sell at \$4.50 to part of the stock sold at \$4.00. The real facts are that the cattle were not offered on the Kansas City market and therefore did not receive a bid of \$4.30 or any other price. It was a Kansas City stock yards man who told the owner that the stock would sell at \$4.50 to \$4.60, and the sale of a part of the cattle at \$4.00 as reported by the Kansas City post card was made at \$4.10. There is absolutely nothing to the post card story except that the Hill City shipment came through Kansas City. It is a lie pure and simple but it is a sample of what the post card sends out to the whole of St. Joseph Territory.
