CATTLE.

Market Acting Well Under Moderate Supplies, Prices Stronger.

The strong tone to the killer trade vesterday was still in evidence this morning. Under moderate receipts and the influence of better beef weather the market is developing an encouraging degree of firmness, especially considering the fact that Lent begins tomorrow. The pre-Lenten bear argument was played quite prominently by killers last week but this week little has been heard about it and packers are acting like they had no fear of finding an outlet for their dressed product. Reports gave the five leading markets around 20,000 cattle today as compared with 25,400 a week ago and 23,300 corresponding day a year ago. For the two days supplies show a falling off of 15,000 head as compared with the corresponding days a week ago and the figures also indicate a shrinkage as compared with a year ago. Esti-mates gave the local market 2000 cat-

mates gave the local market 2000 cat-tle for the day.

Proportion of steers in today's sup-ply was again quite large but the num-ber available was by no means in ex-cess of the demand. Local buyers were all in the market, apparently with good orders, and there was pretty good inquiry from eastern or-der buyers in evidence. It did not take long to get the market under way and the movement scaleward showed fair activity with an early clearance resulting. Prices were strong to a shade higher, 10c up in some cases. The strength noted to-day puts values 10@20c higher than last Friday.

The run turned up a fair showing of serviceably good medium and weighty beeves. Best at hand made \$6.35, with other desirable lots selling at \$6.00 @ 6.25. The fair to good steers sold largely at \$5.70 @ 6.00, with light, trashy classes selling on down

In the neighborhood of twelve cars or approximately 2500 head of sheep and lambs were received at the sheep and lambs were received at the sheep house this morning. Joseph H. Choate, at a dinner at the Lawyers' club in New York, said of a piece of legal chicanery:

"It was mean; too mean. It reminded me of a sneak of a lawyer in practice in the far west. This chap was defending a man in a promissory note case, and he knew he was going to lose. Data Collected by German Naturalist Show That Animals Often Become Wiser Than Their Parents.

A German naturalist has been colecting data to show that animals learn by experience, and thus, in some instances, become wiser than their un-


