Market Rather Slow to Start, Prices About Steady.

There was little change to note in the general fat cattle market today. as compared with the opening session week. Receipts were moderate, both here and at outside centers. Locally, the supply was estimated at 2,000 head and around 2,200 came in. A week ago arrivals numbered 2,564 and a year ago, 1,712. Combined re-ceipts at the five leading markets to-taled 24,100, as against 25,500 last Tuesday and 19,000 a year ago. Early trade was not very active or of large volume, traders being rather

slow in getting down to actual business. Several factors, including the late arrival of part of the offerings, big fills and reports of slow, weak openings at outside markets, tended tomake buyers a little slow in taking hold freely at the opening. Later, however, the movement became more

The Charge of Prof. R. H. 

FARMING ON BOOM.

Crop Cultivation Takes Place of Cattle Raising as Argentina Industry.

Chicago, May 15.—Agriculture has greatly progressed during the last twenty years in Argentina, according to Francois Crastre, in telling of agriculture and cattle breeding in that country. In 1895 fully 59 per cent of the total exports were cattle, and 39 per cent farm products. These figures, changed to 49 per cent and 47 per cent, respectively, in 1903, while today farm products make up 62 per cent is cattle.

"With this agricultural development of bulls bought in England, and a stallion, Diamond Jubilee, cost 787.—There are immense plantations in Rio Negro, Chubut and Santa Cruz, which mostly belong to English companies. The largest estate belongs to the Argentine Southern Land company, an English estancia, which possesses 656,000 hectares. 


