Vast Fortune is Uncovered in the Weaver District of Arizona.

Prescott, Ariz., June 16.—What is acknowledged to be the richest face of ore ever uncovered in the Weaver Mountains is now exposed in the 700-foot level of the Alaska mine, owned by the United States Gold Mining Company.

The pay streak is 4 feet in thickness, carrying on the average 2.44 ounces of gold to the ton, and a large portion is an iron oxide sampling \$298.25 to the ton.
