MEAT PRICES GOING UP?

It is not improbable that the cost of fresh meat to the consumer will be advanced before long. In fact, already there has been a slight rise in prices for certain pork cuts and the way things are headed a further advance in this class of meat and also in beef and mutton is not surprising.

Live hogs sold on the local market yesterday at \$7.95 per hundred pounds. This is the highest price for hogs sold at this point since March 11, a period of over four months.

Pat cattle have been working toward a higher range of prices and a top of \$7.00 on yearling steers and heifers this week stands at the highest point since last March.

It is high time the people of St. Joseph were waking up to a full realization of what this city has and what it can become by proper effort on the part of her citizens.

Pigs that have the run of clover and alfalfa make the best gains if fed a little corn and some of the nitrogenous feeds, all meat, skim milk or wheat middlings, however, it is usually more profitable to depend upon the clover and alfalfa pasture and not feed the more expensive foods.

REAL COWBOYS IN SPAIN. Over in the Castilian Country They Do Real Feats of Riding.

"We boast a good deal about the Western cowboys and the wonderful feats on a horse and in rounding up the cattle," remarked Arthur S. Pennington of New Mexico, "but I was in Spain during the past winter and saw some cowboys over there that could give our Western lads something to think about and to copy.

"They have about a dozen different names for cowboys in Spain, but these down in the Andalusia region are generally called ganaderos. That section is given to cattle and sheep raising and no matter how small the ranch or farm, there are always plenty of cowboys. The ganaderos are usually tall, thin, wiry chaps, who love their calling, and they ride remarkably well, the only thing being that they have poor horses. Any one who knows horses will understand me when I say that the ganadero rides high, on a large saddle with a long stirrup and straight leg, using a single rein and heavy curb.

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## GAME PROTECTED

Steady Progress in Movement Looking Toward Protection and Propagation.

### STATES ARE WAKING UP

And Passing Laws for Regulating Hunting of Game Birds and Animals.

Washington, D. C., July 28.—The various states are awakening to the necessity of protecting game birds and animals and steady progress in the movement for the increase of game and the establishment of game preserves is reported. The demand for game birds for restocking is always larger than the supply. Comparatively few quail were available last year and the Hungarian partridge is in somewhat less demand than formerly, because of the high cost of the birds and the uncertainty as to their successful acclimatization. Importations of pheasants were unusually large and many birds were reared on state and private preserves. In the winter of 1910 the county was aroused over stories that thousands of elk were threatened with starvation in Wyoming and, in fact, a demand was made on congress for money to buy them food. An unexpected thaw early in March saved the suffering animals.

### GOOD ROADS IN TEXAS.

Agitation for Better Highways Epidemic in Lone Star State.

San Antonio, Texas, July 28.—In line with the good roads movement which is almost epidemic in Texas, the business men of this city have formed a committee for the purpose of building the link in the great Texas auto way from this city to the Gulf coast, a distance of 150 miles. At a meeting, a committee of fifteen was named to push the work and co-operate with like committees in the other counties. Some of the counties have already finished their part of the work and only a part of the road remains to be built. It is proposed to make this highway so perfect in its surface that automobiles may maintain a speed of thirty miles an hour in perfect safety. Hear Corpus Christi it will connect with the great Gulf coast auto road now building which, when completed, will extend north from Brownsville into the Red river country and will be the longest auto road in the United States. The interest now taken in this effort indicates that every link in the road will be completed within two years. To do this work, many of the counties have organized highway districts and voted bonds, some of them in the sum of \$200,000.

### HARVESTING IN FULL SWAY

South Dakota Farmers Begin to Reap Their Grain.

Sioux Falls, S. D., July 28.—Harvesting of small grain is in progress in many parts of the state, and in some localities the threshing machines are commencing to tell their stories, indicating a very good crop was raised in South Dakota this year.

There are quite a number of grain fields that are being cut with binders, but in many cases the grain is very short to bind. This makes it necessary to cut the grain with a mower. An instrument or device not before used to any extent in South Dakota is proving successful this season. It is a "buncher," which is attached to the mower bar and bunches the grain as it is cut. Grain on cornstalk ground could hardly be secured without it, as in securing it with a rake all the old cornstalks would be gathered in, which would be decidedly undesirable. Corn throughout the state remains in good condition and is being rapidly cut with prospects of being a very good crop. It yet continues about two weeks further advanced than during most former years.

### STATE DUNNED FOR OLD BILL

Debt Contracted Fifty-Six Years Ago Bobs Up for Payment.

Sacramento, Cal., July 28.—State Treasurer Roberts has received a communication from a San Francisco attorney asking about a warrant issued by State Controller Samuel Bell in December, 1855, for \$6,831.47 to the G. D. Bliss Company for beef supplied the state prison at San Quentin. When the warrant was issued there was not enough money in the state treasury to pay it. In 1861 the legislature passed an act specifying that Bliss could get state bonds equal to his claim by presenting his warrant to the state treasurer.

### HOGS CANNOT PROMENADE

Kentucky Town Council Forbids Them Use of Streets.

Hazard, Ky., July 26.—An order just promulgated is causing a lot of comment and not a little ill-feeling in this thriving municipality. The order reads as follows: "By order of the Town Council: 'All hogs must be put in pens. Any hogs found on the streets beginning with Monday, will be put in the town pen by the marshal and kept there at the expense of the owners. 'It is a matter of town pride and hazard spirit to quit associating with hogs on the streets. Every hog owner will certainly not hesitate to keep his hogs out of sight hereafter.'"

### THE BROAD-TIRED WAGON.

Bed Close to the Ground Saves the Farmer Much Lifting.

Every farmer knows that there are numberless small jobs about the place that require the use of a wagon where the bed will be close to the ground so as to make the lift as short as possible.

That need has been met with the low-wheel wagon and has made it practically indispensable for general farm use. It can be used for hauling fodder, manure, hay and grain, gathering apples and hauling baskets, fruit, clearing the fields of stones and stumps and carrying tools and timber for fixing up fences, or any odd job, say, like hauling away a fallen tree. Then there is nothing that fills the bill better for all kinds of work in the cornfields. There is no earthly reason why a man should lift the corn as high as his shoulder when the low wagon will permit him to perform the labor in the same amount of time, to say nothing of the wear and tear on a man's back and body. Almost every year a farmer buys

some implement that he can use only during one season of the year—perhaps only a few days; but the low wheel wagon is something that he can use every day in the year.

The broad tires make the draft lighter, and that means saving the team. Of course for certain kinds of road use there will always be a demand for the narrow tire wheels, but on a smooth surface and particularly where the ground is soft the pull on the team is decreased 25 per cent to 50 per cent for the simple reason that the broad tires do not sink into the ground; the wider bearing surface of the tire distributes the load in such a manner as to buoy the wagon up and keep it on top of the ground.

Especially on plowed ground or very muddy roads these wheels do not mire like the ordinary wheels, which, of course, makes the saving on the horses even greater.

If one does not care to buy the whole wagon many farmers have found it economical to use an old gear that has been lying around useless for want of wheels and get a set of the low steel wheels only. It means getting a new wagon at just the price of the wheels.

### KILL DANDELIONS, TOO.

Longmont Reports That Little Black Bug Is Destroying Yellow Peril.

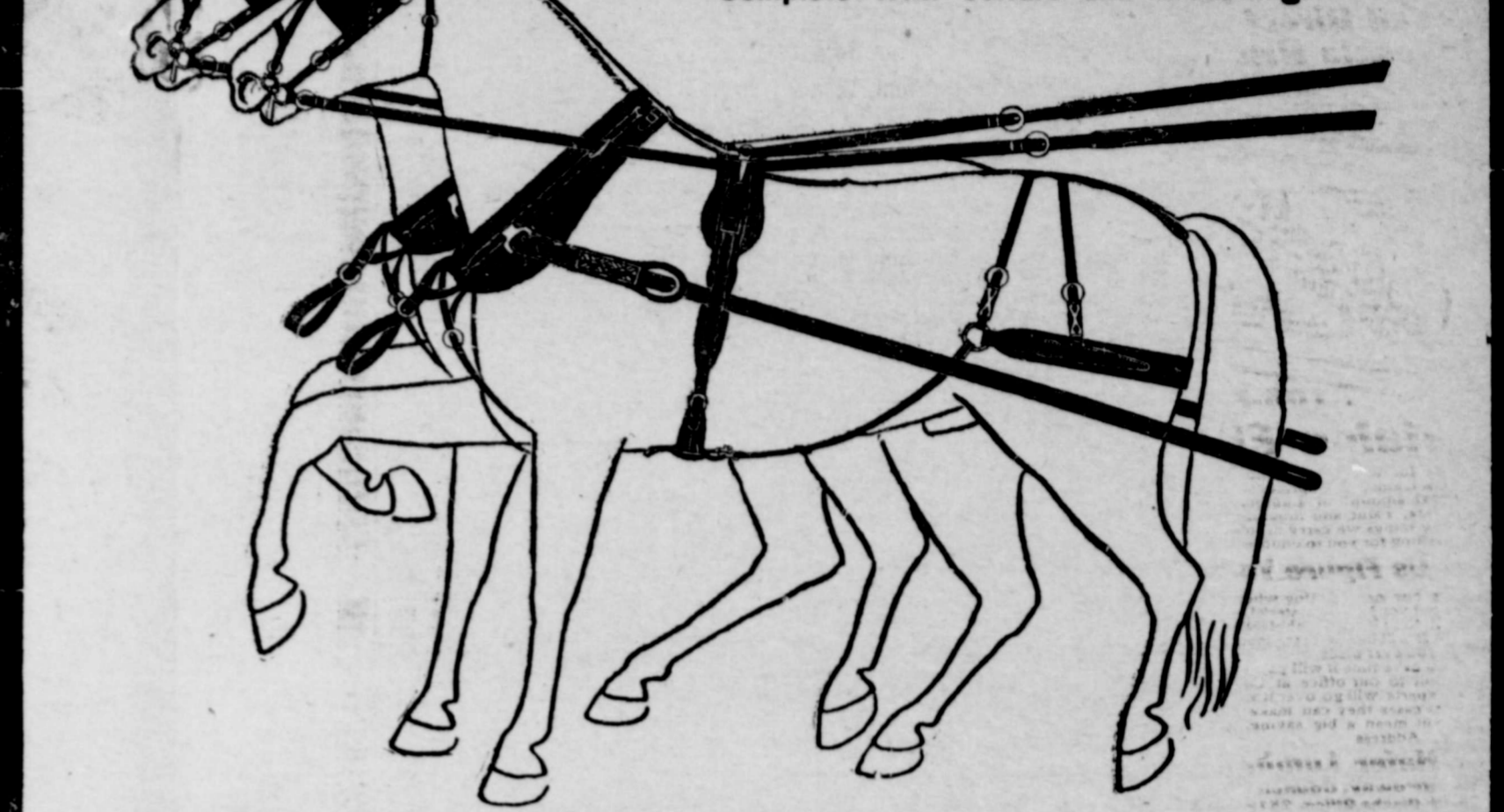
Denver, July 28.—On top of the good news that the drouth is broken and that a fatal disease has attacked the grasshoppers, comes word from Longmont that millions of little black bugs are making war on the dandelions. Colorado has had about eight years of trouble with dandelions, which have overrun the whole state. The reports from Longmont indicate that at last a fatal parasite which was expected to sooner or later destroy this weed, has at last arrived. The black bug is reported to be feeding in the crowns of the dandelions and wherever the attack is made the dandelion is dying. The entomologists at the experiment station should investigate this at once and give the bugs all the encouragement they need. They will be welcome visitors in nearly every section of the state.

### WANTS WILSON TO RESIGN.

Washington, July 27.—It is estimated by friends of Mr. Taft that the president would welcome the retirement of Secretary James Wilson of the department of agriculture, and this is regarded as a possibility growing out of the case of Dr. Wiley, the pure food expert, one of Wilson's subordinates. Secretary Wilson is the veteran of the cabinet, having served continuously as head of his department for fourteen years, under Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft. It is understood that he has been in opposition to Dr. Wiley's course of the bureau of chemistry.

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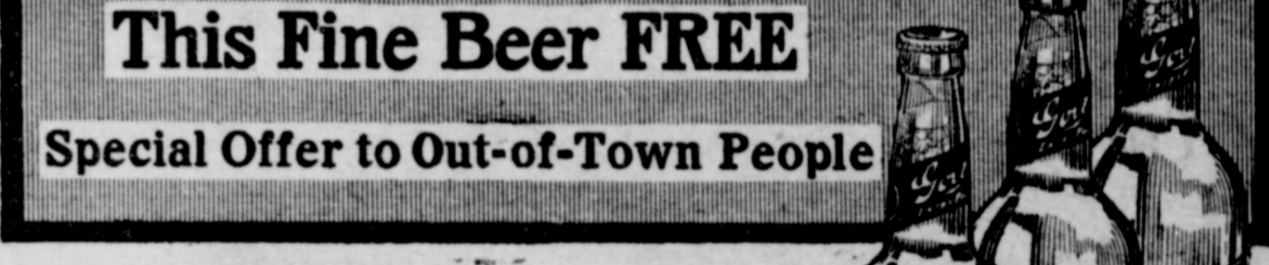
