The Indians nearly always made their totem poles of this wood, be-cause it is soft and they could work it easily with their rude tools. It was valued likewise because it resisted de-cay a long time, and when the grotesquely carved pole had once been set up in the village or at the cemetery it could be reasonably expected to stand at least during the lives of those who made it and set it up. Some of these gigantic trunks hewed in rms of men and beasts, often with nsiderable skill, are the largest pieces of single wood carving in the world, greatly exceeding in size the largest columns and doors of European cathedrals.

The Indians of the region where western red cedar abounded generally chose it for such carpentry as they were capable of doing. Their choice was due to the softness of the wood, which meant a great deal to men who hewed and shaped their beams and doors with no better tools than fire. flint, bone and shell. They made fully as much use of the bark as of the wood. With it they roofed, celled, floored and papered their huts. They wove long strings of bark-some-limes thirty feet in length-into mats, hich they used for beds, tables, lankets, and on ceremonial occasions. They beat the bark to a pulp, aked it in cakes, and after complete to salt at all times.


