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# STEER TRADE IS SLOW

NATIVES HELD ABOUT STEADY WHILE WESTERN CONTINGENT MET SLUGGISH CLEARANCE.

### LATTER AROUND 10c LOWER

Brisk Trading in Cows and Heifers-Calves Rule Higher-Stockers and Feeders Weak to 10e Off.

There was a comparatively light mid-week supply of cattle on the local market today but a fair run in sight in the west. Estimates placed the local marketing at 1,800 head as compared with 2,971 a week ago and 2,-861 for the corresponding day a year ago. The five markets combined reported 44,600 head as against 42,800 last Wednesday and 49,900 a year ago. Total receipts at these points for the first half of the week, 141,300, show a decrease of 10,200 compared with the same period of last week. In comparison with the corresponding days a year ago a decrease of 39,300

There was a fair showing of native steers in the run here today compared with the size of the general supply and the runs of former days this week. There was, however, a notable lack of quality, most of the offerings grading from fairly good down to plain short fed and warmed up classes with an entire absence of choice, well finished beeves. There was nothing in conditions surrounding the trade that would tend to strengthen values materially at this point. Chicago, with 19,000 cattle on sale, wired a steady to 10c lower opening and advices from the other centers did not indicate anything better than a steady trade.

Opening trade did not develop much life but as the session progressed buylers began taking hold at generally steady prices and by noon the bulk of the arrivals at this point today with all but a few loads to the day's offerings. Quality was fairly decent on an average and generally at about steady figures. The general trade in western steers, however, was slow with a weak feeling prevalent. At noon pens still contained quite a few cattle with bids considered fully 10c lower than early yesterday.

What few cows and heifers of western origin offered, on the other hand, scales on a basis of that kind.
