Advance During Week-Not Much Change in Stockers and Feeders.

Gains noted, however, are the result of light runs at all points and the opinion prevails that it will not take much of an increase in general marketing early next week to bring about a reaction in the trend of trade. The International Live Stock Show will be in full blast at Chicago next week and that may be the means of bringing out too many cattle for immediate demands on that market. What the general market most needs right now is a period of moderate supplies to allow packers to work off a lot of medium and cheap beef accumulated in the recent heavy liquidation of short-fed stuff. If this relief is granted there is reason to hope for an imed there is reason to hope for an im-proved range of prices. On the other hand if the country continues to over-crowd the market with warmed-up and short-fed cattle a break from current levels is practically unevitable.

No strictly good or choice beeves have been on sale here this week. The best here have sold at \$7.00@7.25, with a good portion of the short-fed offerings finding outlet at \$6.25@7.00, and warmed-up classes on down as low as \$5.00@5.25.


