Washington, D. C., Dec. 18—The foreign commerce of the United States in the year about to end will show an increase of 200 million dollars when compared with the immediately preceding year and a larger total than in any earlier year of our commerce. Imports, while falling below those of 1910 in the earlier months, have, in the closing period of the year shown a marked increase, indicating that the total for the year will differ but little from that of 1910, which made the highest record in the history of the import trade. 

nations of these products. "Since coming to this country, have seen the establishment of many new stockyards, the abandonment of ld livestock trails, the building of ne superb railroad systems through ut the West, the improvement of the ass of stock on the range, and, het, a general evolution in the conduct of the range industry, down to its present systematic and business-like basis. I have noted the building of the great packing houses at Fort Worth, Denver, Oklahoma City, and a numerous other interior points, and the en-largement of the big plants at Mis-souri river points and Chicago—all to accommodate the growth of our inaccommodate the growth of our industry. The improvement in the methods of marketing our products from
the purchaser to the consumer has
been coincident with the economical
growth of these big packing concerns.
To them is largely due the credit for
increasing and fostering our export
trade. Without such instrumentalities
of trade we could not have marketed
abroad our immense surplus. They




