PLAN BIG MUSHROOM FARM

Oklahoma Will Grow This Table Delicacy on Large Scale.

Oklahoma City, Ok., June 20.—Those Oklahoma Cityans whose dietary equipment requires an occasional indulgence in the table luxury of young mushrooms will soon be relieved of the necessity for having recourse to the canned variety, according to arrangements now being made by Fred E. Thomas of the Thomas Printing Company, who will establish a plant for the culture of this most delicious of vegetable delicacies on his fertile forty-acre tract five miles southwest of the stock yards. This is the first industry of its kind to be opened up in Oklahoma and promises to inaugurate under the most promising physical conditions a new and flattering profitable departure in the state's truck development.

For four years Mr. Thomas has been shaping his business affairs with the end in view of sparing a few hours each week for the general supervision of such a plant, and last winter decided that he had so systematized the different departments of his enterprise that he could execute his favorite hobby. As he began to go deeper into the matter the subject became fascinating and began to take on several tangible shapes.

Remarkable the successful irrigation demonstrations of the Farmer-Stockman, he determined to apply water to his tract, which is located at the confluence of the Canadian river and Mustang creek, and the result is that he not only is arranging to grow mushrooms on a commercial scale, but has already planted twelve acres of Irish potatoes, four of sweet potatoes, three of cabbages, two of tomatoes, six of alfalfa, besides a number of acres in asparagus, rhubarb and berries.

The foundation of Mr. Thomas' irrigation project is a state water right covering permanent access to both the Canadian river and Mustang creek. The plant was installed by John R. Borden of the Wylie Manufacturing Company and is admittedly the most modernly equipped in the county. A fifteen-horse-power gasoline engine has been installed, which operates two pumps, one for Mustang creek and one for the Canadian river. Leading out of Mustang creek is a 250-foot flume, oval in shape, of dimensions 16 inches across top and 16 inches deep. The water is forced into two main channels, coursing along the high line areas of the tract. Laterals and gravity do the rest.

INDIANS HAVE WITCH GIRL Savages Persecute Her Because She Puzzles Folks With Sleight-of-Hand Tricks. Malone, N. Y.—Down on the St. Regis Indian reservation, which lies partly in the state of New York and partly in the Province of Quebec, a young Indian girl, aged fifteen years, has been raising a furore and the Indians assert she is a witch. Her name is Iola Razon. When she was finally declared to be a "black witch" she was transformed into an object of dread. The Indians say that when she appears among them either some of their live stock dies, children get sick, or dogs run mad and make nights hideous with their howls. The medicine men have been consulted and with their spells tried to dispossess the evil spirit, but in vain. The squaws instructed their children to shun the "witch girl" and warnings were given not to let her shadow fall upon any member of the tribe, nor on their horses, cattle or hogs. At a council the chiefs decided that the "witch girl" must leave the tribe at once and she went to Luzerne Mountain, where she has an uncle engaged in basket making. The little Indian is bright for her years and is ambitious to become a teacher among her people and put an end to their superstitions. She has been to school and by a few simple tricks which she performed by way of entertainment startled the blue and cry of her having the "evil spirit."

EX-PRIEST HAD MANY GEMS Theory of Suicide by Poison Abandoned and Now Believed to Have Been a Case of Murder. Berlin.—In the rooms of Dr. Liebe, an ex-Roman Catholic priest, who died of poison recently in his dingy flat, thought to have committed suicide on account of financial straits, the police have discovered \$375,000 worth of precious stones and much jewelry, in an old iron safe. The suicide theory was at once abandoned. Dr. Liebe, who was formerly an army chaplain, was previously a Catholic missionary in India, China and Japan, and it is believed he acquired his passion for jewels while in the east. He became a Protestant ten years ago and was about to marry. He died after taking a drink from a bottle labelled "anisette." Among the gems were 230 sapphires, 218 diamonds, 164 turquoises, 50 rubies and a number of pearls. The gem of the collection was a magnificent golden communion chalice richly studded with precious stones, 428 in all. BABY'S FALL FROM TRAIN Child Leaped Through Window and Was Picked Up but Little Hurt. Lambertville, N. J.—Kenneth Weiss, 2 1/2 years old, fell from the window of a swiftly moving train here and seems to have been but slightly hurt. The train was stopped and the child was picked up. A superficial examination showed that its head was cut. The child was taken on to the hospital at Easton. The parents of the youngster are Mr. and Mrs. H. Weiss of Trenton. They were on their way from that city to Easton. Mrs. Weiss sat holding the boy near an open window. Some object outside attracted his attention and he sprang up and pitched out.
