**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51** proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; the assumption by the district of any indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less

### New Food Tips

#### CRANBERRY QUICK BREAD

- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- $\frac{3}{4}$  cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1-3 cup orange juice
- 3 tablespoons white vinegar
- plus water to make 2-3 cup
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- $\frac{1}{4}$  cup melted shortening
- 1 cup halves or coarsely chopped raw cranberries
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Sift together flour, soda, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Beat egg; add liquids, orange rind and melted shortening. Add all at once to flour mixture; stir until flour is just dampened. Add cranberries and nuts; stir just enough to blend well. Turn into greased  $8\frac{3}{4}$ " x  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 60 to 70 minutes. Remove from pan; cool several hours or overnight before slicing.

#### DATE CRISP

- 1 pound dates, chopped
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 cup finely chopped nuts
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 cups rice cereal
- Flake coconut

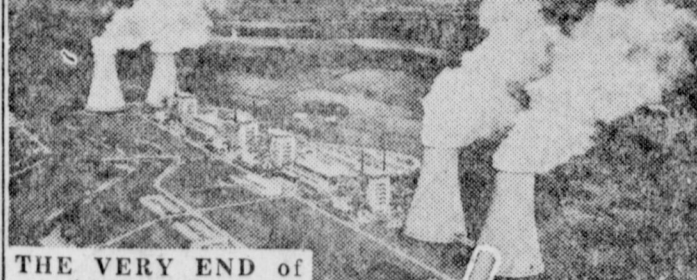
Cook dates, eggs, sugar and fat over low heat for 7 minutes, stirring constantly. Cool; add nuts, vanilla and rice cereal. Form into three or four rolls and roll in flake coconut. Chill and slice, or pack in shallow pan that has been buttered, sprinkled with coconut and cut in small pieces.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article III a new Section to be known as Section 49-d authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs and to dispose of such storage facilities and water upon such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe; providing for the use of funds received from the disposition of acquired storage and water; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 49-d, as follows: Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the State, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. To this end, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in and from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following governments or governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State; by interstate compact commissions in which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, the Texas Water Development Board may also, with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as State bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on

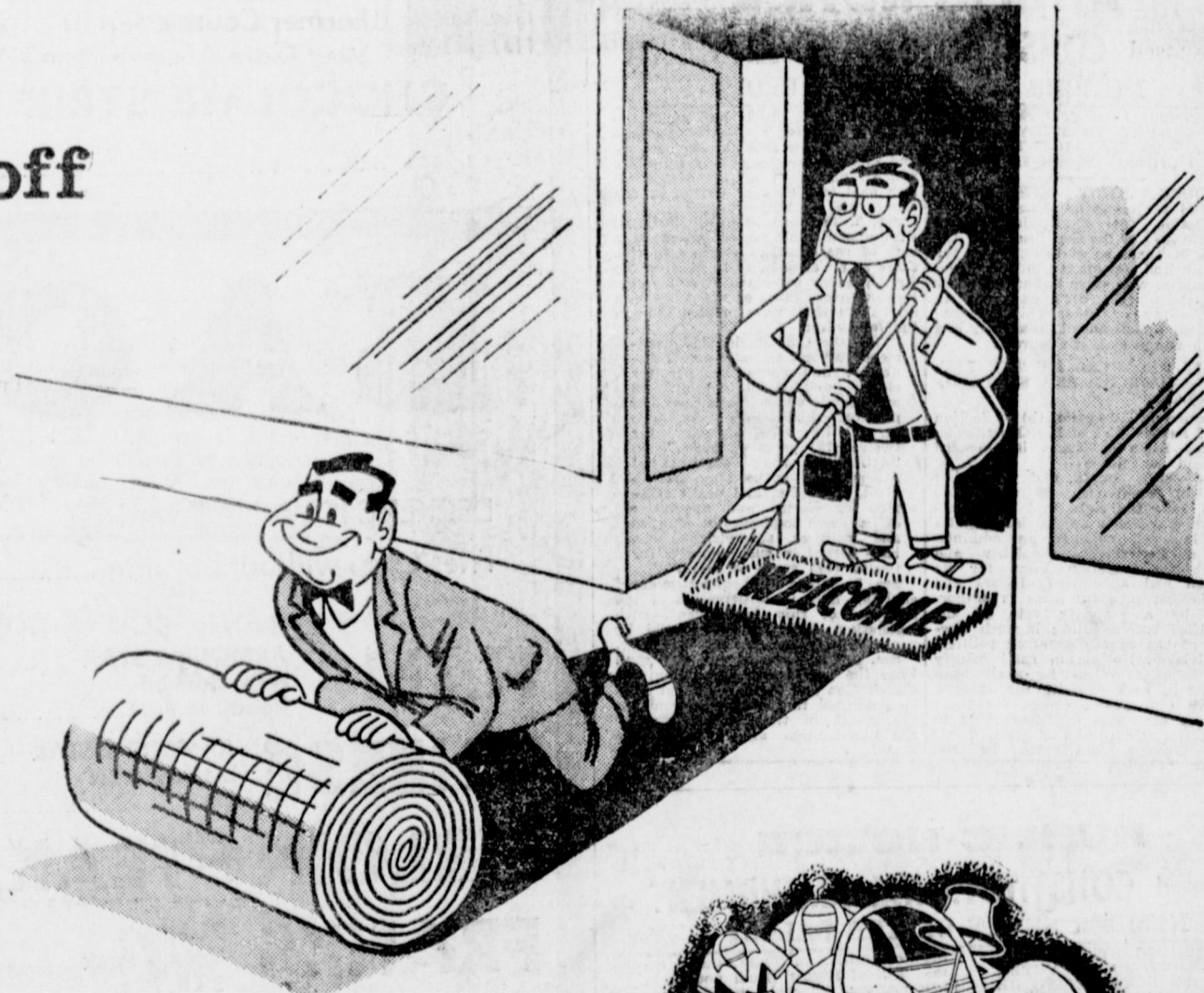

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36** proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulations to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13** proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

New automobile insurance rates effective August 1, seem to be much more equitable than anything we have seen in the last two years. In this territory, the premiums for drivers over 21 years with no "merit rating" charges under the old rule will be so little different that it will be hard to notice, and those with charges will be real happy with the reductions affected.

Base rates for male drivers under 25 are a little higher, which is probably justified by the record in most cases. Many of these who had charges under the old system will find nice reductions in premium. We believe that the elimination of the costly system of recording so much irrelevant information will result in lower rates for everyone in standard classifications within a year or two.

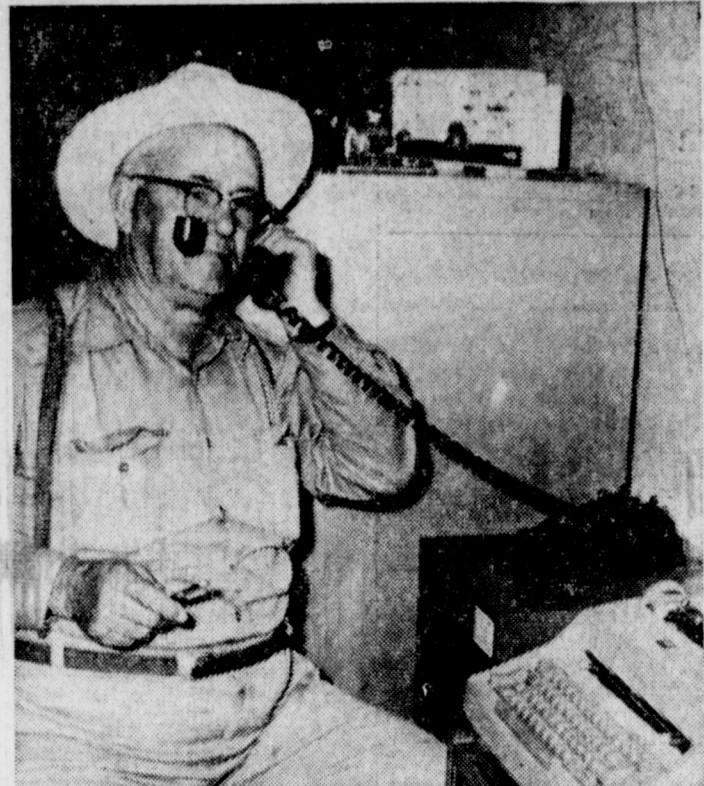

### High Plains Tours to Feature Flame Cultivation of Weeds

Results from flame cultivation control of weeds will be viewed and explained during tours at the High Plains Research Foundation on Friday afternoon, August 10 at the Foundation's research farm at Halfway, Texas, located 46 miles east of here. The Texas Butane Dealers Association sponsors the tours.

The tours will start at 1:30 p.m. from the headquarters building and close at 4 p.m. with an "experience exchange conference" in which farmers using flame cultivation will join a panel of scientists and professional flame cultivation experts in reviewing progress in this new field of farm economy practices.

Tractor drawn wagons will transport the visitors on the tours. Stops will be made throughout the 310 acre farm where the results of flaming will be shown on corn, grain sorghum, castorbeans, soy-

beans, sesame, peanuts, cotton, sugar beets, blackeyed peas, and green beans.

A demonstration of the use of flame cultivation equipment will be held with cotton. Included will be cotton planted June 21 and July 17, to show the results of early flaming. Cotton planted on May 24 will also be flamed.

The tour will close with an exhibit of flame cultivation at the Halfway community grounds. The critique will be held at 4 p.m. on the spacious lawn around the Killgore Memorial Building and Jim Hill Greenhouse.

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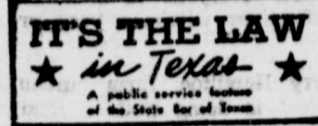

IMPEACHING A WITNESS

A story they tell on Lincoln is how he once proved his client's innocence by "impeaching" an eye witness. Lincoln's client had stolen a chicken, the witness vowed, at a certain time on a certain night. Asked how he could see so well at night, the witness declared "by the light of the moon—just as clear as clear."

Lincoln "impeached" the testimony with ease by pulling an old almanac out of his pocket. It showed that no moon was up at that time, nor was it full on that date.

Trials are hard on everybody—witnesses and parties alike. They often take place when other ways to settle a dispute have failed, and there are hard feelings. But granting good faith, people do make mistakes in what they recall. After they have told their story a few times, many are dead certain—like Lincoln's witness—that they did see and hear what they say they did.

And so, for the sake of justice, courts allow each side to test a witness in so obviously prejudicial or so obviously twisting the facts that the cross-examiner easily discredits his story.

But often sincere witnesses tell different stories, and the jury has a right to know how much weight to give each. It is the jury's sworn duty, in fact, to weigh the credibility of witnesses. And a good way is to see how a witness' story hangs together under fire or checks with other known facts.

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER FROM SENATOR JOHN TOWER
Committee: Banking and Currency Labor and Public Welfare

Senator John Tower (R-Tex.) in his weekly report to Texas constituents, today predicted Senate passage of the satellite communications bill—setting up a private corporation to handle space communications such as those made possible by the new Telstar satellite—with only a small minority of liberal Democrats dissenting. The text of his report follows:

You have probably been reading a great deal this past week about the protracted filibuster which has occurred in the Senate concerning the Space Communications Satellite Bill. There is a very small handful of liberal Democrats who are making a concerted effort to prevent the passage of this bill. This legislation is favored by the President of the United States and it is favored by an overwhelming majority of the members of the Senate. It was passed by a phenomenal margin in the House there are a few people in the Senate who feel that private enterprise should have no hand in the development of outer space.

I feel that, unless this bill passes, we may fall behind the Russians in the race to utilize outer space for purposes of communication. We have developed techniques and methods of putting satellites into outer space, from which signals can be sent by the United States, and be received in other countries, and vice versa. All of you are familiar with the very great success which Telstar has had, and the wide attention that it has attracted throughout the world.

The purpose of this Space Communications Satellite Bill is to establish, as expeditiously as possible, in conjunction and cooperation with other countries, a commercial communication satellite system, as part of an improved global communications network which will be responsive to public needs, as well as to national objectives.

This bill provides for a cooperative effort between the federal government and private enterprise. Actually, private enterprise would do most of the administration and management of the project, and the government would be helpful and cooperative, and, of course, would provide some of the necessary hardware to get the system into operation.

The bill would create a private corporation, made up of the usual corporate board of directors, and stock would be sold in the corporation. It would be the function of this corporation to develop the communications satellite system. This would be under the supervision of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Federal Communications Commission.

ission. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration would, for example, advise the FCC on the technical characteristics of the system; it would coordinate research and development of programs in space; and it would assist this corporation by furnishing it with satellite launching and associated services.

The private corporation which would be established by this act and operate, in conjunction with foreign governments, or foreign businesses, a commercial communications satellite system. It would furnish, for hire, channels of communication to U.S. communications "common carriers"; that is to say, to any communications outfit in the country, on an equal basis. It would make available, to them, the means of transmitting communication signals, through this system. It would own and operate terminal stations which would be licensed by the Federal Communications Commission. It would conduct, or contract, research and development related to its mission. It would acquire physical facilities, and the hardware necessary to get the job done.

I feel that this is a very worthwhile proposal which represents a great stride forward in international communication. It is my hope that this filibuster will soon be broken in order that we can get on with the passage of what I consider to be a very necessary bill.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT IBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to Section 11a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, renumbering said Section, and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled may never exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled be amended and renumbered so as to read as follows:
"Section 11-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who have resided in the state for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind or aid to dependent children, nor while he is receiving assistance from any completely state-supported institution; and provided further, that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of state funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds to any individual may never exceed the amount paid to that individual out of federal funds; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments shall not exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided.
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
