MISSOURI'S BIG WHEAT CROP

North Part of State Had Unusually Heavy Yield This Year. Columbia, Mo., Aug. 21.—The Missouri wheat production will be almost 200,000 bushels greater than was estimated by the state board of agriculture at the end of last month. The monthly state report, subject to the final report, showed that the estimated yield of the Missouri wheat crop would be 9,887,000 bushels. The government also gave the Missouri estimate at 23,599,999 bushels.

FOR BETTER FARMING

MILLION DOLLAR FUND TO PUT AGRICULTURE ON A FIRMER BASIS. Chicago, Ill., Aug. 21.—If the farmers won't go to school in order to learn how to improve their crops, send the school to them. This is the method of operation of what is probably the greatest movement ever started to stimulate agricultural development. Back of the movement is the crop improvement committee of the Council of Grain Exchanges, an organization composed of nineteen of the twenty-five largest exchanges in the country.

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
