We must do something about this matter and the sooner the better. We would like to hear from people on what they consider to be the best solution to the problem.

The matter rests with the county commissioners. They can call another election anytime they desire, and doubtless will discuss the question at their meeting next week. "The time to have a battery checked is when it still seems okav," he added.

"Service stations will gladly advise on how to care for the number of cattle and calves on battery on which you depend so much. Oil Change, the addition of anti-freeze and putting reinforced tire chains in the trunk should not be postponed until some cold or blizzardy morning when thousands of other last minute car owners are compelled by weather to give emergency attention to their vehicles.

The change-over from summer to winter driving also calls for an inspection of windshield wipers, whose blades may have dried out from summer heat or age, Musick said.

Automotive experts further recommend that the wipers should exert one ounce of pressure against the windshield glass for

each inch of blade length. "Many service stations and auto dealers now regularly use a simple test device to determine whether your wiper arms exert his pressure, needed to keep you

under adverse weather conditions Brakes, tires, headlights, parking lights, signal lights, exhaust system, anti-skid tire chains and seat belts are also important items to check on, the safety
