



On Dec. 22, 1824, four years after the arrival of the first mismaries from Massachussetts Kapiolani defied the terrible Pele on the rim of the boiling cauldon of Kilauea Volcano on Hawaii Island.

She camped there all night, determined to prove that the god of the missionaries was stronger than Pele. Kapiolani's subjects trembled, their anguished faces reflecting the glowing red liquid rock that boiled beneath them. They waited, certain that an

enraged Pele would snuff out their lives with one terrible cenvulsion of blazing lava. But nothing happened. In the mornng, Kapiolani hurled this chal-

Greeting cards for Christmas show, each season, an increase n the number of religious subects - but this has not always been true. In fact, the carliest hristmas cards often had designs that seemed to have no connection with the holiday.

Instead of Nativity scenes or symbols of holly and mistletoe, arly American Christmas cards of the 19th century were decorated with roses and portraits of oung ladies, according to The Encyclopedia Americana. Often, lump robins were pictured siting on tree branches dripping ith icicles.

In this early stage pin-up girls vere not unusual. Kate Greenway drawings were frequently ised, some cards picturing sinle figures from her drawings, thers portraying dancing girls ith garlands of flowers.

About 1870, cards were frosted nd fringed with heavy silk.

Christmas Story Borrows Legends From Ancients

In establishing the date by which Christmas is celebrated commemorating the birth of Christ, it is interesting to note that Christendom did not begin its calendar computations until almost 550 years after the birth of Christ.

Much of the Christmas story is still unknown and untold; but legend and story has traced its history since the beginning when Christ preached among the people, "Love thy neighbor as thyself."

Christ was thirty years of age when the people of His time recognized Him as the Messiah of God. In face of the shepherds and Three Wise Men, it wasn't until the Holy Spirit descended upon Him at the baptism in the Jordan that His teachings were accepted by the Christian world.

Strangely enough, many influences have had their effect on the festival of Christmas as it is practiced today, and none of them "Christian" in the true sense of the word. Yet, with them lies the true, romantic, rich beginnings of the Christmas Story.

History tells us that from every epoch of history, from the old, old Babylonian Festivals, to the Druid Mysteries, from the Roman Saturnalia, to the Egyptian Midwinter Festival of Foods and finally to Christ Himself, has come segments of the whole of the Christmas

But there is more to the Christmas Story. Much of what the Christian world in this twentieth century observes, stems from a time long years and even centuries before Christ.

Christmas Card Traced to 1843

'Who sent the first Christmas card? is a question for which, it seems likely, a completely accurate and satisfacrory answer may never be found. Probably, the earliest cards were 'do-ityourself" project - Handwritten holiday greetings on hand-decorated notepaper. Popular claimant for first Christmas card honors Cole-Horsley card, designed in Britain in 1843 by John Calcott Horsley, an artist, for Sir Henry Cols, director of the Victorian and Albert Museum.

Since the card showed a fam ily group toasting the holiday with glasses of wine, the card supposedly stirred criticism by temperance adherents - even though the card also depicted clothing the needy' and 'feeding the hungry.' However, another story has it that Sir Henry gained his knighthood as the result of the acclaim he received of for sending the first Christmas card.
