Packers Bearish on Butcher Stock Prices 10@15c Lower-Calves Steady-Stock Cattle Firm.

Cattle receipts here were 2,000 about the same number as were mar-keted a week ago. The five western markets had a combined total of 21,-900, a decrease with a week and a year ago. Locally, there was a fair showing of dressed beef steers and all weights were represented, the general quality ranging from common to good There was very little trading on the early market. Buyers looked over early market. Buyers looked over the field but did not get down to bus-iness until late in the forenoon. The feeling to the trade was weak but af-ter the market was established it was at generally steady prices. The mar-ket, however, was not very lively, al-lough a good final clearance was made. Vearlings and tidy weight cat-Yearlings and tidy weight catthe with quality were fairly good sell-ers but medium and plain heavy kinds were slow moving. Tops landed at \$8.70.

The hog market was active and substantial gains were made over Monday's general trade. Receipts were 8,500, an increase over the supply of a week and a year ago. The five big markets had 59,000 hogs com-pared with 48,000 last Tuesday. Chi-cago had a light run, around 16,000 hogs, and the market was active and higher. The quality of the local sup-ply was good. Buyers entered the competition early and started hogs to the scales at 10c higher prices. There was a brisk movement at the advance. 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




