FIRE HURTS PASTURES.
Dodge City, April 8.—A prairie fire
swept over a strip south of Dodge City
Sunday, five miles in length. The path
of the flames were a half mile wide.
The fire was stopped when it came to
the Arkansas river, a quarter of a
mile below town. The fire was kept
from farm buildings, but, ruined
much pasture. On the Beeson farm
all but fifty acres of the 1,800 acres of
pasture was burned over.

AIRSHIP REAL WARCRAFT
Guns of Zeppelin IV Which "Invaded"
France, Shoot Any Direction.

Berlin, April 8.—Reference was made recently to the fact that successful trials in firing machine-guns from a Zeppelin airship had been carried out. The importance of these trials lies not so much in the circumstance that they were made in the place from which they were made. It is pointed out that the French airships carry machine guns in cars, which can, therefore, be fired only at objects on the same level or underneath them, and are useless as a means of defense or attack against objects above them.

The new German Zeppelin airship "L Z 16," or, as it will be named when it is taken over by military authorities, "Z 4," which "invaded" France a few days ago, is provided with a platform on the very body of the balloon which is reached through a species of chimney from the car attached underneath. On this upper-deck platform there is room for several machine-guns and several soldiers with rifles, and all airships for army and navy are to have such platforms, it follows that they will be able to defend themselves against or attack any other aircraft above or around or beneath them. Such platforms can, of course, be fitted only on airships of the rigid type, and as it is claimed that Zeppelins can rise and can maneuver more quickly than French airships, the Germans are congratulating themselves on having an aerial weapon superior to any that their rivals can manufacture.

Writing in the Militar Wochenblatt, an unofficial organ of the Prussian war ministry, on the development of aerial craft and the military importance of them, Captain Schmidt, of the Eleventh Bavarian Infantry regiment, makes several interesting suggestions. He remarks that the presence of at least two persons in every airship has been proved to be absolutely necessary. One of these persons must attend to the technical direction of the aeroplane, while the other makes observations.

In the newer machine, he adds, an arrangement is made by which the apparatus can be worked from the seat of the observer as well as that of the pilot proper, and he suggests that both should be thoroughly trained pilots. Seeing that airplanes enable pilot and observer to have clearer outlook both in regard to the land underneath and to the direction in which the machine is flying, Captain Schmidt states that the German army administration should direct attention to this, though without declaring the latter unsuited for military purposes.

Captain Schmidt also points out that the types at present employed for military purposes are very much alike, which renders it practically impossible for flying men to distinguish between their own and foreign machines. A way will have to be found, he says, to obviate this difficulty. Furthermore, he declares that the task of approaching the enemy as inconspicuous as possible must be made easier for the pilot, and in his opinion the machines must be painted with a color that renders their discovery difficult.

Some means must also, he adds, be discovered of rendering the humming of the motors less distinct. In conclusion, he states, that while improvements are being made almost daily in the construction of machines, the most perfect apparatus is worth little unless in the hands of an excellent trained personnel, but he believes that in this respect a Germany is in no danger of being left behind.

MISSOURIAN'S TAX LIST.
Real Estate \$1,212,273,215. Personal Property \$355,430,270.

Jefferson City, April 8.—The State Board of Equalization has completed the assessment of real and personal property of the state for taxes for the present year and certified the result to the various counties. The Board of Assessors of the cities of the state.

The total assessment is fixed by the board at \$1,567,708,515, as follows: Real estate, \$1,212,273,215; personal property, \$355,430,270. This is an increase of \$15,835,441 over last year. The increase principally is on real estate. The assessment last year was: Real estate \$1,196,437,772; personal property, \$358,972,522.

The assessors returned a total of \$1,608,367,797, as follows: Real estate, \$1,212,273,215; personal property, \$396,094,582.

The following is the valuation of the different classes of property:
Personal, \$456,474,965; town lots, \$753,241,180; horses, \$34,427,497; mules, \$14,182,269; asses and jennets, \$707,202; neat cattle, \$22,420,197; sheep, \$1,374,915; hogs \$5,585,730; all other live stock, \$134,368; money, notes and bonds, \$10,321,905; banks, \$67,716,919; corporate companies, \$17,716,912; all other personal property, \$57,433,270.

The assessment for St. Louis is \$569,874,074, against \$368,351,629 for 1912; Jackson county, 191,906,922 against \$188,235,640 last year; St. Louis county, \$5,130,415 against \$2,019,112 last year; Buchanan county, \$41,683,697 against \$41,248,454 last year.

The reduction of the assessment by the Board of Equalization of the assessment returned by the assessors was made because most of the assessors listed banks at 100 cents on the dollar, while the board equalized on the basis of about 55 per cent.

The assessors returned the banks at \$109,097,045, and the State Board made this assessment \$67,873,019. The assessment for banks last year was \$89,515,936.

FLOOD SAME AT CAIRO.
Say Crest Has Not Yet Been Reached—Work Continues.

Cairo, Ill., April 8.—The flood conditions at Cairo have remained virtually dormant, although the river shows a slight rising tendency. The weather forecast predicts that the river will mark a little more than fifty-five feet before the crest is reached and that for a week or more thereafter a steady subsiding will hold the river at Cairo above the dangerous high stage of 54 feet.

The river marks 54 feet and 7-10 tonight. No relaxation of efforts in protecting Cairo levees is being taken place as those in charge of the work realize the dangerous situation.

While water covers the country in every direction from Cairo for miles and the river is high above the city, baseball game was played yesterday between members of the Seventh regiment and Cairoites. Moving pictures of the game were taken.

Wickliffe, Ky., on the hills a few miles below Cairo is a haven for refugees, more than two thousand seven hundred are camping there.

The levees at Mound City are in good shape tonight and the people there believe they will be able to keep water out of the town.

The village of Mounds is under water, one to thirty feet deep.

Much relief work is being done by the government and the state out of Cairo stations.

MAY LEARN TO BE FUNNY
Harvard Plans to Establish Department of Humor.

Cambridge, Mass., April 8.—It is probable that a department of wit and humor will be established at Harvard University. A number of classes are now given over to the study of the modern language and their literature, but none offers any encouragement or assistance to the student whose literary abilities lie in humorous lines.

The department will fill a long-felt want. Dean Briggs, assistant Prof. C. O. Copeland and Barratt Wendall, are among the faculty who would have to be considered for the new chair, it is said.

TRAPPED BY AVALANCHE.
Many Die From Exposure—Rescue of 200 Improbable.

Rome, April 8.—Two hundred laborers and engineers working on the Furka pass across the Alps, were blockaded Friday by the fall of an avalanche near Domodossola. Some of them have already died from exposure and grave anxiety is felt whether it will be possible to rescue the remainder.

A spell of cold weather set in throughout Italy. Snow fell during the night on Vesuvius.

CRUSADE AGAINST VEILS.
Englishman Prefers to See "Human Face Divine."

London, April 8.—Women who constantly wear veils suffer in time from deterioration of the features. This was the statement made by Sir John Cockburn, M. D., speaking at the Royal Sanitary Institute. Sir John said he wanted to make a crusade against women's veils. Nothing, he said, was more beautiful than the human face divine, while veils had awful spots, making women look as if they had black eyes and fearful grimaces.

CAPTURE WILD SWANS.
Birds Die Soon After and Will Be Mounted.

Salina, Kan., April 8.—Hunters near Salina recently captured two swans. The birds were badly injured and died soon after being taken captive. One was exceedingly large, measuring 52 inches from beak to tail. The birds are being mounted.

TREATING SHEEP SCAB.
Dip Made of Tobacco or Coal Tar Is Preferred.

Dipping in a reliable dip is the proper treatment for sheep afflicted with sheep scab.

Use a dip made of lime and sulphur, tobacco and sulphur, or one of the coal tar dips.

Remove all sediment from the lime and sulphur dip, as it injured the wool.

Tobacco dips should never be boiled.

For a general dip a tobacco or coal tar preparation is to be preferred to lime and sulphur, as a lime and sulphur dip has little effect in destroying the sheep tick or louse.

A fresh solution should be used for the second dipping. This is absolutely essential if the lime and sulphur or the tobacco and sulphur are to be used.

Mix the dip well in the vat.

It is better to use warm water than cold water in dipping sheep, as warm water cuts the grease and allows the

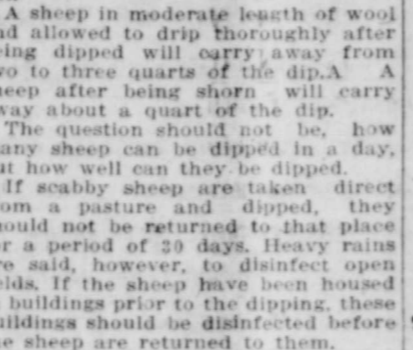

RAPE AS FORAGE PLANT.

It Is Highly Recommended for Feeding Stock.

Lexington, Ky., April 8.—Rape, a new forage plant, which is rapidly coming into use in Kentucky in feeding live stock, especially hogs and sheep, is highly recommended by the Kentucky Experiment Station, and in a bulletin just issued by E. J. Kinney, assistant agronomist at the experiment station, the characteristics and utility of the oil seed rape as a forage plant and the methods of planting and promoting its growth are carefully described. Important parts of the bulletin are given below.

"Rape is grown in the United States primarily as a forage plant, but in Europe it is quite widely grown; mainly for the production of oil from the seeds. The oil is used for illuminating purposes, for table use and for lubrication. Rape belongs to the cabbage family and has the fleshy character of the leaf of cabbage. In shape and general appearance the leaves resemble those of the rutabaga or stock turnip, but the roots are like those of cabbage. The leaves grow very rank and are sweet and tender. The plants grow to a height of 1 to 4 feet, depending upon soil and season.

"The principal uses of rape for forage are for pasturing or mowing for sheep, hogs and sometimes cattle. It is of course, impossible to cure rape so that it may be used for hay, neither is it satisfactory for silage purposes. When pastured, the stock should be turned on when the plants reach the proper size, usually six to eight weeks. Before it is eaten down very closely the stock should be removed in order to give the plants an opportunity to send up new leaves. If handled in this way a field will furnish pasturage for a long period.

"When used for mowing purposes— that is, cut and fed, rape should not be cut too closely or it will be killed. If cut from 4 to 5 inches high three cuttings can often be secured.

"When sheep or cattle are turned on rape it is well to give them some dry feed previously or they may bloat seriously, especially if the rape is wet. Hogs are not affected, however, and can be turned on at any time. The greatest danger from bloating occurs when first turning on the pasture, for after stock become accustomed to feeding on it they can be turned directly on rape without much danger. Stock will sometimes refuse to eat rape readily at first, but they soon learn to relish it. If fed to dairy cattle rape should be fed after the milking period, otherwise the milk is liable to have a cabbage flavor. Rape is very palatable and makes a splendid feed to use in connection with grain for fattening hogs and sheep. It is very cheaply grown and its use will in many cases greatly cheapen meat production. Those who have grown it are very enthusiastic in its praise and consider it their most profitable crop. It is not suitable for feeding alone, for, although very nutritious, it contains a large amount of water and would require the consumption of too great a bulk in order to satisfy the animal.

"Rape requires rich land—in fact, it can not be grown with the addition of manure and in some cases, nitrogenous fertilizers, is necessary to give the maximum yield. The land for rape should be well prepared and finely pulverized. The seed may be sown very early and until as late as August. It takes a rather hard freeze to injure rape and it will furnish pasturage until nearly Christmas if the pastures are made. It is usually large enough to pasture in four to eight weeks.

"Rape seeds are very small, about like buckwheat seeds. Three to five pounds are sufficient to sow an acre. It may be sown broadcast and harrowed in lightly or covered with a brush, as is sometimes done with turnip seed. Sowing in drills about 24 inches apart is considered by many the best way to plant it. It is claimed that stock will not tramp the plants as badly when sown this way, and they have a tendency to keep between the rows. In addition, sowing in drills allows for cultivation, and in weedy land this is, of course, an advantage. Rape can be used as a catch crop in many cases to advantage. By disking land after the removal of wheat or oats and sowing rape, some good fall pasture can often be secured. Rape can be sown in oats about three weeks after the oats are up and not interfere with the growth of the oats to any great extent. After the removal of the oats, the rape grows rapidly and quickly furnishes good pasture. The seed are sown broadcast and covered with a harrow. If care is taken the young oats will be injured very little. Rape may also be sown in corn at the last cultivation and furnish late fall pasture.

"There is but one variety widely grown in this country. This is the dwarf Essex. Seed can be secured almost any seedman. It should always be bought by sample and tested for germination before being sowed. The seed costs from 7 to 10 cents a pound."

TALK OF FARMER'S LOANS

Broad System to Settle "Back to Farm" Movement in Colorado.

Denver, Colo., April 8.—Two movements of far-reaching importance to Denver and Colorado, looking toward the immediate resumption of the mountain park project, and to a comprehensive scheme of loans to the farmers of the state, were announced recently at a meeting of the directors and the committee chairman of the Denver Chamber of Commerce.

Gordon Jones, president of the United States National Bank, and chairman of the farmer's loan committee, has been selected by the directors of the chamber to join a party, representing a number of commercial associations of the country, that is going to Europe next month to study the foreign system of loaning money to farmers. The party expects to sail from New York the latter part of April.

The second movement, announced by Warwick Downing, chairman of the mountain park committee, is to the effect that an option has been secured on 2969 acres adjoining Genesee Mountain, west of Golden, for conversion this spring into a Denver park, as the first link in the chain of mountain parkways that are to be established in that vicinity. Twelve thousand additional acres are to be added later.

The deal for the option was closed last week, opening the way for the immediate construction of roads and trails through the tract, making it accessible and attractive to visitors. It is proposed to expend between \$10,000 and \$15,000 in the development of the park this summer.

Frederick Law Olmstead, of Boston, the civic beauty expert employed by the mayor and park board, has recently arrived in Denver. He will at once outline the scheme of improvement to be made in the Genesee Park. Downing told the members of the Chamber of Commerce that the only hindrance to the opening of the park this summer might lie with the legislature. He said that the bill granting to Denver police powers along the road to and within the park was encountering some opposition and that it would be necessary to obtain the enactment of such a bill to properly safeguard the new parkway.

The land lying within the Genesee Park belongs to private owners and will be sold at an average of \$11 per acre. The tract lies close to the Colorado and Southern line along Clear Creek, and the officers of that road have promised to assist in the construction of a road from the trucks to the park. The park can also be reached from Denver by an automobile road running through one corner of the land.

President Yetter of the Chamber of Commerce said that every effort will be exerted to convert the tract into a parkway this summer and that as soon as improvements in the Genesee district are completed the other parkways will be taken up and beautified.

The plan of loaning funds to farmers and new settlers, far strongly urged by Gordon Jones, president of the United States National Bank, has suggested that a system of long-term loans, such as is employed in Europe, be devised and made a permanent institution. He said that a similar scheme had been adopted in Illinois by a party that had formed a trust company to carry it on.

"The success of Denver and Colorado depends largely upon the success of the agricultural interests," said Jones. "If a scheme of long-time loans can be put into effect, the 'back-to-the-farm' movement can be accomplished with excellent results.

"All of the old countries have some method of financing the farmers. Some of the loans, I understand, run as far as thirty years. The farmer makes semi-annual payments. If he is unable to raise the money in Europe, he can raise it on his banker for the amount, and make it up the next, or if he has an exceptionally prosperous year he might make a double payment.

"Under a system of this kind there can be no financial failures, such as now retard the development of Eastern Colorado, but by mutual cooperation the farmer and the state are both benefited."

GERMANS HOARD GOLD.

Peasants Withdraw Funds From Banks—Resent Levying of Tax.

Berlin, April 8.—Next to actual war nothing is as disastrous as the fear of war, and the people of Germany are beginning to realize this in the most graphic manner. At this time when a drastic effort is being made to saddle the people of Germany with the heaviest military tax in the history of the country, banks all over are complaining not only that no deposits are made but that deposits are daily being withdrawn at an alarming rate.

The same people who used to ridicule the French peasants for keeping their cash hidden in old stockings are now imitating their methods and are hoarding their money to such an extent that no money is available for industrial enterprises, and the whole community is suffering. Germany is thirsting for gold and is trying to get it everywhere in London or America, but with scant success. France is throwing German securities on the market, and gold goes out of the country across the Vosges much faster than it comes in from other countries. Germans are not heavy investors in foreign securities, but what little is held here, principally American and Canadian railroad shares, is being rapidly sold in spite of the declining prices.

The amount of gold in actual circulation is daily decreasing, while the whole country at the same time is being flooded with paper money, which smaller holders are already hesitating to take, fearing that it will depreciate in value should war break out.

AVIATORS TO COMPETE

For \$50,000 Prize Offered by London Newspapers.

London, April 8.—Several aviators have announced their intention of competing for the Daily Express' £50,000 prize for a trans-Atlantic flight. Gordon England, a British aviator, and Horst Rumpier, a German inventor, have declared that they will enter the contest and the British and Captain F. S. Cody say they will be competitors in both the Atlantic flight and that around Britain.

The Mail says the best experts believe the trans-Atlantic prize will be won before the end of 1914.

Horace Short, the builder of the naval water planes, considers a flight from America to Great Britain with the help of the wind, almost impossible now, and says that a flight in the reverse direction may be accomplished within 17 months.

The only skeptic adds the Mail, are the builders of German airships, who know nothing about water planes. Major Von Parseval considers the Atlantic flight far beyond the realm of present possibilities.

TRIAL MARRIAGES ARE LEGAL

Remedy for New York Conditions Lies in the Legislature.

New York, April 8.—Trial marriages for young women under 18 years old are legal in New York, according to a decision by Supreme Justice Cohalan. If a girl marries with the consent of her parents and whether her husband before she attains the age of 18 the present law in effect permits her to come into court and obtain a decree of annulment as a matter of course, he declares.

"This is to all intents and purposes provided in such cases of trial marriages," he said. "It is a condition the remedy for which lies with the legislature and not with the courts."

The decision was in the case of Mrs. Iva Mundell Coster, who sued to annul her marriage with Norman B. Coster. The justice found that although Mrs. Coster's mother had consented to the marriage, the daughter was only 17 years old at the time, and was entitled to maintain an action for annulment.

A SUGAR TRUST. A sharp boy in Grangetown walked into a grocery's shop.

"Please, mister," he said to the proprietor, "mother told me to ask you whether there is such a thing as a sugar trust."
