Cows and Heifers Sell Active at Steady Prices-Bulls and Calves Firm-Stock Cattle Steady. .

Early estimates called for 1,800 cattle at this point. Total receipts in sight in the west were 26,000, about sight in the west were 26,000, about the sameanumber as was received as week ago but slightly under the run a year ago. Early advices from competitive points did not indicate any material change in prices from those of Monday. Included in the local offerings, which ran largely to dressed beef steers, there was a creditable showing of good killers. COWS, BULLS AND MIXED.

As was the case Monday, the per-centage of cows and heifers to receipts was not large, and despite the unfavorable weather conditions, there was an active demand for all useful offerings. The market was active and a good clearance was made by noon. General quality of the offerings was not materially different from that of yesterday and the supply consisted mostly of small lots and odds and ends. Good to choice cows were ready sellers at firm prices. Common to medium grades ruled steady, but were a little slower sale. All of the packers had orders for good light heifers and mixed yearlings and for this class of stock trading was very active at steady to strong prices. Cows ranged up to \$7.50, bulk selling from \$6.85 down. The better grades of heifery stock ranged from \$7.50 @ 8.25. There was a fairly active demand for bulls and steady rates were paid. Calves were picked up at steady prices. The supply was light. Tops sold at \$8.50.





Lexington, Ky., April 8.—Rape, a new forage plant, which is rapidly coming into use in Kentucky in feeding live stock, especially hogs and sheep, is highly recommended by the Kentucky Experiment Station, and in a bulletin just issued by E. J. Kinney, assistant agronomist at the experiment station, the characteristics and utility of the plant are clearly set forth and the methods of planting and promoting its growth are carefully described. "Rape is grown in the United States primarily as a forage plant, but in Europe it is quite widely grown, mainly for the production of oil from the seeds. The oll is used for illuminating purposes, for table use and for lubrication. Rape belongs to the cabbage family and has the fleshy character of the leaf of cabbage. In shape and keneral appearance the leaves resemble those of the rutabaga or stock turnip, but the roots are like those of cabbage. The leaves grow kery rank and are sweet and tender. The plants grow to a height of 1 to 4 feet, depending upon soil and season.

"The principal uses of rape for forage are for pasturage or soiling for sheep, hogs and sometimes cattle. It is of course, impossible to cure rape so that it may be used for hay, neither is it satisfactory for silage purposes. When pastured, the stock should be turned on when the plants reach the proper size, usually six to eight weeks. Before it is eaten down very closely the stock should be removed in order to give the plants an oppportunity to send up new leaves, if handled in this way a field will furnish pasturage for a long period.

"When used for soiling purposes—that is, cut and fed,, rape should not be cut too closely or it will be killed. If cut' from 4 to 5 inches high three cuttings can often be secured.

The party expects to sall from New York the latter part of April.

The second movement, announced by Warwick Downing, chairman of the mountain park committee, is to the effect that option has been secured on 2000 acres adjoining Genesee Mountain west of Golden, for conversion
