The two officers and their prisoner, the latter handcuffed to Detective Mc-Coy, took their seats in the express, and all went well till a point between Leighton Buzzard and Bletchley. Here Barker on a pretext, was temporarily released from the handcuff which bound him to McCoy. He made a dash for the door, pulled it open. and jumped from the train, which was then going at sixty miles an hour. As he did so Detective Inspector Fowler seized him by the wrist with one hand, and though Barker is a heavy man, held him suspended, while Mr. McCoy pulled the communication cord.
