CHINCH BUGS IN 1/18

Insects Have Appeared in Vast Numbers and Will Do Great Damage.

Leavenworth, Kan., May 1.—The chinch bug, one of the farmers' worst enemies, has started its annual crusade of devastating the fields of wheat. And when the corn begins to poke out of the ground this too will be the prey of the little winged bugs. The pests are now coming out of winter quarters and millions of them infest every field. "In my trip over the country I no-ticed them in great numbers," said P. H. Ross, the farm advisor, yesterday, "During the past few days since it has been warm, the chinch bugs have been n evidence.

"They are now in the adult stage and are harboring in trash, grass and fence rows, and in greater numbers in the roots of bunches of native grass. Investigation has disclosed as many as a cupful in a bunch of grass 6 inches in diameter.

"Knowledge of the habit of the tion. The best method is to turn over the ground in the meadow and along the roadsides is the fall and burn al trash along the fence and hedge rows If this had been attended to last fall

the bugs would have been greatly reduced in number. It "Bugs now flying over wheat fields deposit eggs there which later hatch out into little red wingless insects They pass through five stages before reaching maturity. During all that time the insect lives upon the wheat. As a general rule the bug reaches maturity about harvest time. Before

reaching maturity it crawls through corn fields. "Various fungus growths that are natural enemies of the chinch bug can be used to good advantage in warm and damp weather. Where the bugs are found in clusters the fungi can be introduced and will destroy them in

great numbers."

In view of the fact that the chine oug causes an annual loss of \$40,000, 000 in the United States and destroy about 5 per cent of the wheat and 2 per cent of the corn each year, the farmers should make a determined effort to exterminate them, said Mr.

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




