GOOD OUTLET FOR MODERATE SUPPLY AT FIRM TO 10c HIGHER PRICES.

LIGHT KINDS BEST SELLERS

An \$8.15 Top on Mixed Yearlings-Cows and Heifers Strong to 10c Up-Bulls Strong-Stockers and Feeders Firm.

There was a gain of 600 cattle in local receipts today compared with last Thursday but aggregate marketing at the five leading points fell around 3,000 short of that day. Estimates called for 1400 here and 10,-

900 at the five points.

There was the usual heavy percentage of beef steers in today's run at these yards. Demand held the same good tone exhibited yesterday and the general trend of the market was in the direction of higher prices. In the direction of higher prices, Light and handy weight steers, including yearlings, had the preference with the buying interests. There was an active movement in these classes at strong to 10c higher prices, while the heavier styles, which seemed to appeal less to buyers, moved on a steady to strong basis compared with steady to strong basis compared with the previous day. A drove of choice yearlings, mixed steers and heifers, sold early in the session at \$8.15, which was the highest price scored during the day. The top on stronger weight cattle was \$8.05. Bought Under \$6.00 as Feeders Kansan Cashes 45 Head Today at \$7.90.

A. F. McCianahan, one of the sub stantial farmers and feeders of Brown county, Kansas, was on the market with two cars of steers and a mixed load of stock that sold at satisfactory The shipment en braced 45 prices. The shipment en.braced 45 head of handy weight steers which averaged 1,115 lbs, and which realized \$7.90. Mr. McClanahan picked up this string of steers around home at a cost under \$6.00 per cwt. about six months ago. They were on corn a little short of four months, made a good gain in weight and Mr. McClan-ahan figures a neat profit on the deal at the price obtained for the lot to-

"Crop prospects in Brown county are as good as we could ask for," said Mr. McClanahan. "We have had a little rain that we could have go a third of the corn is yet to be plant-ed. A few days of clear weather, however, will see the finish of corn planting in my loaclity. We never had a brighter outlook for small grains and alfalfa will make a fine crop. There is probably no lover of books who, having the means, would not be glad to possess treasures of the library which have won additional interest from association with great names. It is not surprising that Jean Grolier's copy of Ovid's "Heroidum Epistolae," with Grolier's arms and device, should have brought several hundreds dollars at an auction sale in this city, or that a record price should have been paid for the first collected edition of the "Poetical and Dramatic Works" of Oliver Goldsmith, or that a letter of Garrick's should fetch \$172.

Yet such prices have little to do with literature proper. Many a ma who possesses cheap copies of these auction items may get more enjoyment and culture out of editions the bibliophile would despise than the man who simply has to draw a check for whatever pleases his fancy.

Lord Rosebery, in a recent address in Scotland, defined the function of books as three fold to furnish information required in the professions, to furnish literature and to furnish recreation. De Quincey classified books as pertaining to the literature of knowledge and the literature of power. In neither sense, except from the esthetic pleasures of ownership of a the world of books where they have persed, is said to have cost only about \$750,000, while it brought at auc-
