Pacific Coast City Sald to Have Been Founded March 27, 1776, by Anglican Indians.

Berkeley, Cal.-The yellow, musty ages of an old Spanish ecclesiastical locument in the possession of the Iniversity of California have yielded o researchers a new story of the ounding of San Francisco, which laces the date before the birth of the nation-March 27, 1776.

The document is contained in the Robert E. Gowan collection presented to the Academy of Pacific Coast History by the late Collis P. Huntington. It has just been deciphered by Prof. Frederick C. Teggart. The narrative deals with the journey from Sonora, Mexico, of Padro Pedro Font, first apostle to the Indians of San Francisco peninsula. His party founded a mission at Yuma, Ariz., then crossed the Imperial valley of California to San Diego and moved up the coast to San Francisco.

There, "on the extremity of the white cliff, at the inner point of the entrance to the harbor" the cross wa planted and a settlement established.
