Red Attacks On Isthmus Thrown Back

Finn Bombing Planes Strafe Troop Centers Of Soviets Today

HELSINKI, Feb. 28 (AP) .- Finnish bombing planes continued to strike at Russian communications and troop concentrations while land forces have repelled continued soviet attempts to follow up advantages gained on the Karelian isthmus, a Finnish communique said today.

The communique, however, gave little indication of the indication of isthmus fighting, believed to be raging undiminished in intensity. Finnish sources announced 521

Russian planes had been shot down since the start of the war and also said 1,310 tanks had been destroyed or captured.

The red army last night smashed

at Viipuri and its environs, and artillery-raked no-man's land cluttered with ruins where more than 80,-000 persons once lived, while Finland acknowledged another Russian success above the Arctic circle.

Attacking across the ice of fro-

Viipuri bay the soviet forces attempted to force their way past islands southwest of Viipuri, evidently aiming at outflanking Fin-nish defense lines on the western rim of the Karelian isthmus. Encirclement of the battered city,

already at the mercy of medium range Russian artillery, also was an aim of the Russian drive. Military sources said the Rus-an attack across the ice was likely to result in heavy Russian losses since the Finns have strong

Midland County Has Profited by Water Facilities, Soil Program

News that the house of representatives, in its agriculture bill, failed to include an appropriation for the water facilities program was a blow to Midland county and to many similar communities.

Since the water facilities office was established here year ago last October, 66,000 acres of this territory have been placed under agreement, 20,000 more are now in process and applications are on file to service an additional 100,000 acres with improved water systems.

Under this branch of the federal agricultural program, many farms which had been without well water. and whose owners or operators had been forced to haul BY MRS. R. W. ROCHON water for both domestic use and for livestock, now have the benefit of scientific storage of water from dams on draws, so that wells are stored with water for a year round supply.

The United States senate will consider the agricultural program probably this week and may pass their own recommendations back to the house. If proper efforts are put forth, the senate may not lose sight of this important branch of farm projects and as a result may get it reconsidered in the house.

Wire your senator, or write him fully, if you are in favor of continuing the opportunity to provide an ample water supply for every farm set-up.

WASHINGTON.-Martin L. Dies is about to take himself out of the limelight for the duration of the presidential wars.

First, he's going to propose a sweeping change in the conduct of the congressional committee which bears his name.

Then, in June, he plans to sus-pend hearings until after the elec-

Dies wants to do away with public hearings, on the ground that irresponsible witnesses often make sweeping and unjustified statements which, when widely circulated, do harm and create a wrong impression.

Instead, he is going to urge the committee to conduct future hearings behind closed doors, with press and public excluded. It would issue periodic statements sum-marizing the testimony and expressing conclusions.

These statements would take the form of reports by the committee, rather than individual statements Dies believes that they should and could be unanimous.

The committee will be asked to



Soil Conservation **Program Expands**

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 28.-Almost 3 million acres of Texas farm and ranch land went under the soil and water conservation ban-

ner for the first time in 1939.

That brings the figures for the 24-year-old campaign to 16 million acres of crop land protected against loss of soil and rainfall while some 14 1/2 million acres are still in need of protective measures. Thus Texas is off to a good start.

in 1940, a year slated to see record breaking advances in conservation as all agencies of the U.S. Department of Agriculture unite with state and local organizations in a joint drive to protect soil and hold the rain where it falls. Detailed 1939 figures, as announc-

ed by M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer, and C. (Dutch) Hohn, soil and water conservation specialist, both of the Texas A&M Extension Service, include 766,211 acres of crop land terraced, 426,625 acres protected by furrow damming, and 1,254,699 acres pit cultivated. Around 1,500,000 acres of crop land were farmed on the contour for the first time.

County-owned tractor-grader outfits in 172 counties accounted for 410,991 acres of the terracing total On range and pasture land, 56,689 acres were terraced, 97,800 ridged, 195,736 contourfurrowed, and 30,-904 subsoiled or chiseled. Spreader dams constructed during 1939 will divert run-off water and spread it over 108,855 acres of grass land. Much of the work on range land was done in cooperation with the AAA's range conservation program. County agricultural agents held 1,094 meetings to explain details of the Texas Soil Conservation District, Law. The meetings drew an
