

PARIS, June 1 (AP).-The full German force, backed by heavy artillery and dive bombers, smashed against the last of the Allies barricaded on the wreckage of Dunkerque tonight as other Nazi armies to the south strengthened their drive along the Somme.

"I am a practicing dentist in Midport my family, and, therefore, cannot and will not allow these false rumors and reports to go unanswer-I call upon the people of Midland to give me fair and just treat-ment. (Signed) V. P. Neissl.

British Battleship Is Declared Sunk By German Raiders

BERLIN, June 1 (AP)—An authorized German spokesman said today the battleship Nelson, 33,950ton flagship of the British home fleet, had been sunk with the loss of 700 of the crew of 1,320.

The statement was made in response to a question at a press conference and was not volunteered. A correspondent told the spokes man there had been rumors a battleship had been sunk, whereupon the spokesman replied the rumors were true but declined to give de-tails for "military reasons."




As Jehovah Witnesses Were Given "Bum's Rush" by Odessa Citizens Saturday Afternoon

The group then went to the ranch house, where last night's threatened trouble occurred.



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. How should roof construction be framed around a chimney?

A. In roof construction, rafters

or structural members which frame the chimney opening at the side are called trimmers, and the mem-bers supporting the intermediate afters and framing between the trimmers are called headers. For roof framing around chimneys the headers and trimmers should be doubled. However, for a sloping roof where headers are less than four feet in length and the chimney is either at the ridge or the eaves, the trimmers may be single. All wood framing should be kept at least two inches away from the chimney masonry, except when eight inches of masonry are used outside the flue lining the framing play be flush with the chimney masonry. Fill the two-inch space between chimney masonry and the wood framing with a fire-resistance





GEOLOGISTS' FIELD TRIP NEXT WEEK INCLUDES SACRAMENTOS

prominent Midland geologist and authority on the Permian Basin, has prepared for the Reporter-Telegram the following preliminary description of the outcrops to be seen next weekend on the joint field-trip of the West Texas and New Mexico geological societies, which will take 10:55 a.m. Morning worship. in the Sacramento Mountains.

CONFERENCE IN SACRAMENTO MOUNTAINS By E. Russell Lloyd

On Friday, June 7th, geologists of Texas and New Mexico will assemble in Almogordo and Clouderoft, New Mexico for a two day study of the geology of the Sacranento Mountains.

Petroleum geologists spend most of their time looking through microcopes identifying formations revealed by the drill far below the surface. To understand properly these formations, however, the geologists must know what they look like where they come to the surface of he ground not only in one locality but in as many widely scattered localities as possible. Petroleum geology is becoming more and more matter of regional study and paleogeographic interpretation. For example a geologist working in the Permian Basin who has not had an opportunity to study the great reef passes of the Guadalupe and Glass nountains is at a distinct disadvantage in interpreting the subsurface stratigraphy. This would appear to be axiomatic but many company eologists are required to spend all heir time describing samples, correlating sample logs and drawing subsurface contours. eologists in responsible positions in Midland who have not even had an opportunity to study the Capitan teef in its magnificent exposures in the Guadalupe Mountains. However thoroughly qaulified such a man may be and however extensive his experience in other regions, his superior officers are unreasonable in

o make competent interpretations of he regional geology. Some opportunity for studies of surface outcrops is furnished by various field conferences organized by local geological societies. One of Sacramento Mountains next Saturday and Sunday, June 8th and 9th. Excellent exposures of rocks ranging in age from pre-Cambrian to Cretaceous are found in the bold scarps of the mountains which rise some 5,000 feet above the Tularosa Basin to the west. At High Rolls, the starting point for the trip, the Abo (basal Permian) consists largely of red beds. Near Shelton's ranch, 14 miles farther south, it includes many gray and green shales and limestones. Gradation, however, is not rapid and the red beds continue southward almost to the State line. East of Shelton's ranch near the buth end of the mountains, a new oad climbs through the Permian Teso section. From the gap where his road crosses the mountain it is ossible to view much of south cenral New Mexico.

Between High Rolls and La Luz he upper Pennsylvanian beds, which are probably missing in Alamo Canon, will be examined.

The best exposures of the Yeso formation are on the western face of the mountains east of Tularosa. Yeso is Spanish for gypsum, and elswhere gypsums of the formation sually slump and obscure the arrangement of the other beds. In Nogal Canyon there are enough hard beds to hold the freshly cut anyon walls in place and about 100 feet of red beds, fossiliferous limestones and gypsums are well exposed.

The melting and extrusion of the White Mountain lavas west of Ruioso were probably associated with he sagging of the Mesozoic rocks nto the White Mountain syncline. On the east climb of this syncline ear Captain an almost complete ection of the western interior Mesozoric rocks is preserved. Exmination of the Triassic, Jurassic and basal Cretaceous between Fort Stanton and Capitan will complete



OAK FLOOR SPOTS.

To remove spots and stains similar to water stains from an oak floor without scraping the entire floor, FHA officials suggest that the stains may often be removed by wiping with turpentine, cleaning the wax down to the bare wood and then rewaxing the bare spots. If the stains are in the wood, the wax may be removed in the same way. The spots should then be treated with a solution of oxalic acid. After letting stand overnight, wash away all trace of the acid and re-

Public Confidence Heightened by FHA

Under the influence of the FHA's home-financing plan and its minimum standards and requirements for sound home construction, public confidence in home ownership is recovering from the disillusioning experiences of the depression years, Federal Housing Administrator Stewart McDonald declared at the opening of the 1940 season of the New York World's Fair.

Mr. McDonald spoke at the dedication of the two modern small homes which will afford a tangible illustration of modern low - cost housing for visitors to the World's Fair this summer.

These two small houses were constructed on the Fair grounds under FHA supervision and conform to the FHA's standards for sound home building.

A Tenfold Expansion

As evidence of the advancing re-covery in the home-building field, Mr. McDonald pointed out that "today residential construction is proceeding at a rate 10 times as great as in 1933 and 1934, the two years before the FHA was established."

He explained that in selecting the type of housing to display at the World's Fair the FHA, in cooperation with the housing industry and with Fair officials, had determined upon low-cost small homes rather than more elaborate, costly residences in order to demonstrate what the building industry is now producing for the broadest housing market under the FHA plan.

"Reliable figures tell us that the broad channel of the housing market runs through the 53 per cent of our families whose annual incomes range between \$1,000 and \$2,500." Mr. McDonald declared. But this vast market, sufficient to assure the building industry an almost per-petual normal volume of smallhome construction, was always neglected until the advent of the FHA. he asserted.

Priced at \$2,500 and \$3,100

The World's Fair houses, of attractive colonial design, are replicas of new homes being built and sold under the FHA plan in nearby Long Island communities for \$2,500 and \$3,100, respectively, Mr. Mc-

Donald explained.

The \$2,500 house has four rooms and a bath and provides adequate space for a family of four, he said. With a lot valued at \$150 as down payment, this home could be purchased under the FHA plan for about \$25 a month over 15 years, these payments covering interest amortization of principal, taxes, hazard insurance, and FHA insurance, he pointed out. With \$300 down, it would cost about \$18 a month over \$25 years, he added.

A Home for \$20 a Month

The \$3,100 house has five rooms. With a down payment of \$400, this attractive home could be purchased more than \$20 a month over a pe riod of 25 year, Mr. McDonald stated.

"It is the homes we see here, being built all over the nation this year, that have dispelled the disillusion visited upon the home-buying public by the hectic adventures in production and financing of the last building boom," he declared.

The two World's Fair homes will be lived in during the Fair season by the successful entrants in the "typical American family" contests conducted by 48 newspapers in representative areas throughout the United States.






