LONDON, June 20 (AP) .- A Nazi air fleet authoritatively put at considerable more than 100 planes, dumped hundreds of bombs on England, Scotland and Wales last night and early today in the most extensive air raid of the war on this island

At least six civilians were killed and "some sixty" injured, the government announced. It was the second raid in as many days on Britain and, considering the number of bombs dropped, the reported damage was slight.



Savoy to Be Occupied by The Italians

Is Area Mussolini Has Demanded From French Government

By The Associated Press ROME, June 20 (AP) — Italian troops plan to occupy the Savoy regions of France while awaiting the outcome of armistice parleys be tween France and Adolf Hitler, Ital-

ian sources indicated today.

Savoy is one of the regions Italy has demanded from France, along with the city of Nice, the island of Corsica and Tunisia, in Africa. The military expert of the Rom newspaper Il Tribuna, said the Ital ian action in Savoy would be "join-ed" to that of the German army along a line through Lyon, St. Didier and Clermont-Ferrand, which would bring the Germans to the edge of Savoy.

Italy's air power was flung today into operations over a vast zone in the Mediterranean and far down the eastern coast of Africa as Stefani, official Italian news agency, declared that by Saturday at the latest, there will be no more fighting between the axis powers and battered France.

French plenipotentiaries already nave met Geramns, said Stefani, and are en route back to Bordeaux, presumably with harsh nazi terms for peace in their hands.

"Drastic" Cut In Allowables Are Scheduled

AUSTIN, Tex., June 20 (AP)-A majority of the Texas railroad commission today ordered all Texas oil fields shut down on June 28 and 30. slashed 17.110 barrels daily from the allowable of certain southwest Texas fields and stipulated five general shutdown days in July and August.

The order was said by members Jerry Sadler and Ernest O. Thompson to be the solution to the problem of overproduction and further

loss of foreign markets. Sadler estimated the two June shutdown days with the slash in southwest Texas output, effective Saturday, would result in a net daily average statewide production of 1.115,000 barrels. The U.S. Bureau of Mines recommendation for June production in Texas was 1,-

344,600. The officials said the five shutin days each for July and August applied to the East Texas field which otherwise would have been closed 14 days each month. This will result in an estimated daily average production in East Texas of 425,000 barrels compared to a current 380,000 bar-

Interpreting the War Today

Hope Seen for Next German Opponents In Wear and Tear on Nazi Machinery

BY DEWITT MacKENZIE Associated Press Writer

Herr Hitler's seeming slowness in dealing with France's request for armistice terms has permitted the nazi army to continue smashing at the exhausted French forces and overrunning still further important territory and cities.

Fascist circles in Rome rather let the cat out of the bag this morning when they said that virtually complete occupation of France by the German and Italian armies was probable before the French were handed the axis terms. That naturally puts the screws on the unhappy French government.

The reason for this maneuver

needn't be sought far. Indeed, the German radio today unconsciously summed the thing up for us very neatly in a broadcast picked up in London. This stated that "mem- Be Asked of Nations bers of the French government are not all agreed on the question of laying down arms."

That likely is true, and it is equally probable that many French people are dead against surrender. They would prefer to fight it out. This being the case, it won't be surprising if some French elements

In connection with this battle for the Rhone valley it is interesting to note a report from Geneva which says that the nazi machanized army is showing signs of wear and tear-isn't the same dashing machine which cut the allies to pieces in Flanders. Refugees say scores of worn-out tanks and armored cars have been abandoned long the road.

Well, the nazis still have all the power they need to continue lashing at France. The wear and tear on the German war-machine will be of great interest, however, to opponents who still have to deal with



Army May Test Texan's Electric Machine Gun

DALLAS, June 20 (AP)-A flashless electric machine gun may be-come available to the United States

A Pittsburgh manufacturing company (Westinghouse) will study the weapon and attempt to perfect it. The gun is the invention of Virgil Rigsby of Hull, Tex.

Still in the experimental stage, the gun has a muzzle velocity of 400 feet a second. Experts say it must spit out its bullets at 3,000 feet a second to be effective. Rigsby said the war department had promised to test the gun if a working model of higher power can

be made B. D. Atwell, engineer for the Pittsburgh firm's plant here, said the principle of the gun is sound but "it will take a much higher

muzzle velocity to make a war weapon of the gun."

Atwell said .44 caliber bullets fired from the inventor's model had the force of pellets from an air

Magnetic coils jerk the bullets through the gun barrel. The coils may be operated from batteries or

from a power line. Concealed troops with electric machine guns could silently mow down enemy troops, who would find it difficult to spot the machine





AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ARREST, WITHOUT WAR-RANT, BY A CITY POLICE OF-FICER, OF PERSONS WHO ARE FOUND IN SUSPICIOUS PLACES OR UNDER SUSPICIOUS CIRCUMSTANCES, OR PERSONS WHO COMMIT AN OFFENSE IN THE PRESENCE OF SUCH OFFICER OR OFFICERS.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY
COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MID-

LEGALS

Section 1. That arrest, without warrant, may be made by the Chief of Police, City Marshal, or any other Officer of the City of Midland, when offenses against the laws or ordinances of the City are committed in their presence or where persons are found in suspicious places, and under circumstances which reasonably show that such persons have been guilty of some felony or breach of the peace, or threaten or are about to commit some offense against the law.

Section II. Whereas, it is necessary that this ordinance become effective immediately in order to protect the life, property, safety, health and well-being of the public and of the citizens of the City, the absence of the authority of the Chief of Police, or City Marshal, or other Police Officers of the City to make arrests without warrants under the circumstances and limitations set out in Section I hereof, creates an emergency and a necessity for such powers to become effective immediately, and requires a suspension of the rules requiring ordinances to be read on separate dates; and such emergency is said to exist and said rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance is to be effective from and after it passage.



Eppenauer Changes Name of "Swastika Ranch" to "T-Bar"

SAN ANGELO, June 20 (AP) .-A. R. Eppenauer, former San Angelo and Fort Worth oil operator, today announced he was changing the name of his ranch from "Swastika Ranch" to "T-Bar Ranch." Eppenauer explained that the Indian swastika, which had been used

for cattle branding for 50 years until last year, easily could be confused with the swastika of Nazi Germany. Their difference is in the swastika wings, which are turned in opposite directions. The uninformed and non-observ-

ant have been confused by the ranch's use of the symbol, he said, giving rise to much wonderment and baseless rumors regarding the ranch.
The Eppenauer ranch is in Jeff Davis county. The owner stays there when he is not running the race horses he raises and races. Eppenauer, who still has oil interests in the southwest with headquarters at

Pecos, served with the forces during the first World War.
The use of the swastika is not unique with Eppenauer's ranch. least 14 Texas ranch owners have used the symbol for brands, some

for more than 30 years.
Some are similar to the Nazi cross but others turn their wings in the opposite direction, some have rounded corners, some slant at an unconventional angle.

The swastika in the cow country

grew out of Indian use of the symbol as a good luck sign. Lately some of the New Mexico Indians have disavowed the swastika.
