German troops began massing today to march into riot-torn Rumania as King Carol II, himself the target of an assassination attempt by the pro-Nazi Iron Guard, accepted the resignation of Premier Ion Gigurtu and called General Ion Antonescu to form a new "military" cabinet.

The staccato chatter of anti-aircraft guns kept the city's millions huddled sheepily in underground shelters, but Nazi officials asserted no bombs fell in the capital proper and that the only "damage" was backyard fire set by a British flare on the outskirts.

Authorized Germans admitted, however, that there was "lively activity" between Nazi and British planes in the Magdeburg region, 100 miles west of Berlin—described as the first big air clash at night over central Germany.

## Early Refuses To Give Data On Destroyers

Declares Hitler Can "Find Out for Self" If He Wants to Know

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)-Stephen Early, White House press secretary, said today "Hitler can find that out for himself" when reporters inquired about the movements o fthe 50 destroyers traded to Britain for air and naval bases. Early was asked whether any of the vessels already had left for Canada for transfer across the north Atlantic by British crews. He replied:

"Hitler can find that out for himself—when they leave, where they are, and anything else about them, as far as I am concerned."

8 Destroyers Ready The navy said yesterday eight of the destroyers were being made ready at the Boston navy yard for release to Britain and that they probably would be ready by Friday for American crews to take them to Canada and turn them over to the British: Whereabouts of the other ships was not disclosed, except that they were somewhere on he Atlantic Seaboard.

President Roosevelt met with congressional leaders to give them a complete report on negotia-tions that led up to the trade of destroyers for bases on British Caribbean territories.

Indications of a one-mile west extension of the Todd Strawn pool of north central Crockett County were afforded today by Amerada Petro leum Corporation No. 1 J. S. Todd as it flowed and swabbed clean oil from crinoidal lime. With 2-inch tubing set on bottom at 5,880 feet and with packer at 5,802 feet, the well was swabbed into pits until clean, then was shut in for eight hours. 

The United States acted with great dispatch today to complete its historic swap of 50 overage destroyers for important defense base sites er Carrie had remembered she in six British possessions on this

At Boston, American crews worked on the first group of eight ships, getting them in shape for transfer to the Royal Navy at a Canadian port on Friday, or immediately thereafter

Another flotilla of 6 of the 1,200ton class destroyers was reported to have left Hampton Roads, Va., headed for Boston.

In other unnamed ports along the Atlantic coast, the remainder of the vessels were being made ready. Meanwhile, a 16-man commission

of Army and Navy officers was on the cruiser U.S.S. St. Louis bound for Bermuda and conferences this week with British officials on the base site this country will acquire in the Great Sound of the resort The Bermuda base and another

base in Newfoundland would be in addition to the six acquired in the destroyer swap. The right to bases in those two possessions was granted by the British as an outright gift, but their acquisition was naturally linked with the broader program.

Conferences on the other bases were expected to be arranged shortly. of the empire." Congressional supporters of Roosevelt "aid-to-Britain short-of-war" policy voiced approval of the transaction as a major defense achievement.

Those advocating aloofness from the European conflict condemned it as "an act of war," justification for Hitler to "declare war" on the United States, and an illegal transaction without Congressional approval.
