Fist Fight Breaks

With the spectacle of a hard-hitting Thirty-seven haggard and disheveled British seamen, eight of them fistfight on the floor to testify to injured, told a grim tale today of the shortness of some tempers, the disaster and death in the war at House began its final drive today for a decision on the Burke-Wads-

worth compulsory military training bill. The chamber settled down to consider the measure section by section and to act on the scores of pending amendments. The vote on conscription was expected tomorrow night or Saturday.

Tense feelings burst into the open last night when the epithet "traitor" was spoken and the House beheld Rep. Vincent (D-Ky) and Rep. Sweeney (D-O) throwing punches at each other in the well of the chamber.

The fight followed a speech by Sweeney, who is 55, in which he assailed conscription and accused President Roosevelt of seeking to embroil the United States in war. In the course of the speech, Sweeney mentioned that the slogan during Woodrow Wilson's 1916 cam-paign was: "He kept us out of war.

> "And the people believed it," he said, "and they returned that individual to the White House. "Then they were brought to their senses 5 months later when he put

> us into war." Sweeney returned to a seat be-side Vincent, 5 years his junior, and the flare-up occurred. Each representative landed hard blows to the face until colleagues intervened. Sweeney apologized to the House. Vincent at first repeated his charge of "traitor"-but later withdrew it

Each gave the House his version of the altercation. Sweeney's account: "As I resumed my seat, the gentle-man with whom I had difficulties called me a traitor. He repeated it

again and you know what happen-Vincent's account: "I served in the World War. x x x To say that my President of that

time brought on that war to me was an untruth. x x x "When he came down to sit with me, I got up and moved. x x x "I said I did not want to sit by




