Wait For the "Big Stick"

Renewal Of Talks Between America, Soviets Announced

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP) — A renewal of American talks with Soviet Russia revived conjecture today on the possibility that common concern over Far Eastern developments might establish a basis for active collaboration by Washington, Moscow and London.

The new conversations here appeared to be aimed first at removal of what are considered relatively minor points of friction between the United States and Russia. Success of these efforts, diplomatic sources said, might lead to discussion of more far-reaching question of policy, possibly starting with "aid to China," to which the United States, Russia and Great Britain have all contributed.

Hitler's decision to send Naz troops into Rumania for the ostensible protection and assistance of that new pro-Nazi dictatorship bristles with as many far-reaching possibilities as a porcupine doe with quills.

Such domination will provide the Fuehrer with a strategic position of vast importance. This great military and naval base (for don't forget that Rumania lies on the Black Sea) will give the Nazis a bulwark (either for offense or defense) against Russia, and it will provide a jumping place for a possible Axis drive down through the Balkans to the Dardanelles and the eastern end of the Mediterranean.

Hitler and Mussolini could overrun that territory, and secure the strategically vital Dardanelles it would give them a great leg-up in their assault against the British empire. This would be calculated to enable them to get troops into Syria and Palestine, and to capture the rich oil wells of Iraq which now are controlled by British.

As I see it Hitler's move is aimed in no small degree at Russia. He and Comrade Stalin ostensibly are friends because of the anti-aggression pact, but practically there can be little doubt that they both keep their guns handy as they walk together.

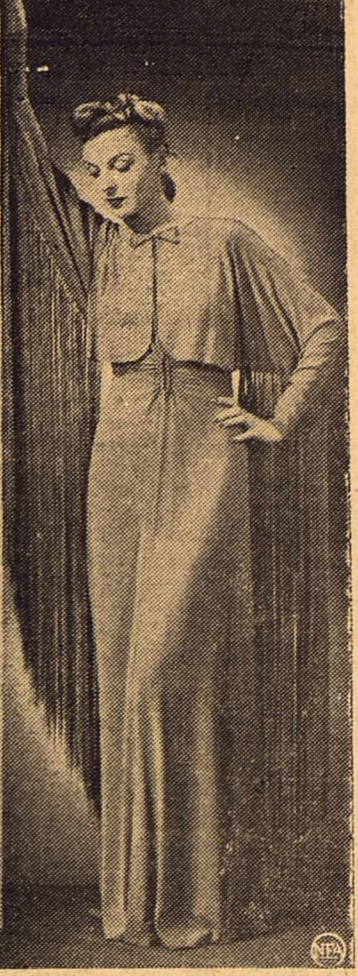

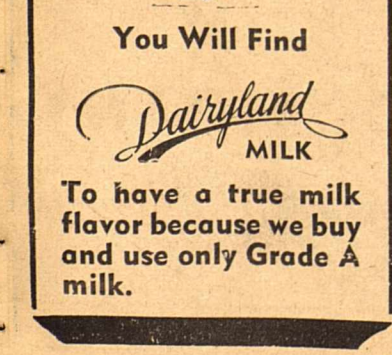

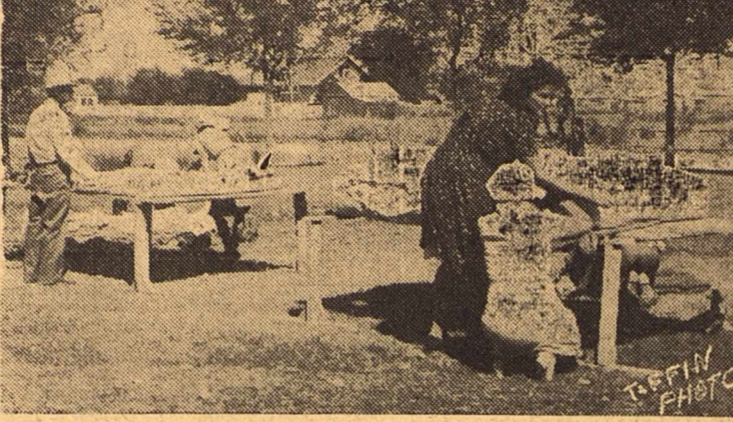
