# Anarchy Threatens Rumania After Bloody Assassinations

### Premier Antonescu Hastens To Put Down Further Iron Guard Trouble In Wednesday Purge Of Sixty-four

Violence Starts When Rebel Wing Of Group Inflicts Revenge For Murder Of Ex-Leader; Former Premier, Jorga, Is Victim Of Bullet

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Nov. 28 (AP).—German troops were brought into the capital today from Pitesci, 65 miles away, to help protect the city as the Iron Guard purge of former members of King Carol's regime continued with the assassination of Former Premier Nicolai Jorga.





Of course, South scolded his partner for not shifting to a club at once after the diamond king held. Such defense is always easier to see after the hand is over.
