Britain Tightens Grip On Mediterranean And Nazis Hit In Channel

German anxiety over Italy's buffeting in the war with Greece, linked with growing British control of the Mediterranean, was reflected in Berlin dispatches today as German and British destroyers clashed in the English Channel.

Closely-connected reports from the belligerent capitals gave this picture:

LONDON—Admiralty reports in-dicated that Britain has launched a broad offensive to sweep the Mediterranean clear of Italy's war fleet and strike at Italy as the "Achilles Heel" of the Rome-Berlin Axis.

The runner-up team-of-four in the recent Metropolitan Champion-ship consisted of Mrs. A. M. Sobel Waldemar von Zedtwitz, Charles Van Vleck and Myron Fuchs, all of New York. Mrs. Sobel, one of the outstanding women players of the United States, played with Walde-mar von Zedtwitz as partner, and he paid high tribute to her play dur-

ing the contest.
Mrs. Sobel cleverly employed the suit-directing play to defeat her opponents on the hand shown today. The suit-directing play is used under certain conditions to inform partner what suit to return. Mrs. Sobel (North) had solid hearts from the king down to the eight-spot. Her normal opening would be the king. She knew that her partner had some controls because of his opening bid and double of four spades, so instead of leading the king of hearts, she led the eight.

The play could cost nothing and might easily gain a trick.

Von Zedtwitz could easily read that the eight of hearts was not a fourth-best lead. Why then was it led instead of one of the honors? He correctly read the message that the low card of the sequence asked for the return of

the lowest suit not trump.

When dummy won the opening lead with the ace of hearts and then played a spade, Von Zedtwitz put up the ace and returned the five of clubs, giving Mrs. Sobel a ruff. As Von Zedtwitz still had to make his ace and queen of clubs, the contract was set one trick.
