California Gains Three Places In Legislative Body

Texas Seats in House Are Unchanged At 21; Others Are Increased

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP) -Reporting a continued "westward movement" of population matched by heavy gains in the South, the Census Bureau advised President Roosevelt today that, on the basis of the 1940 census, California was entitled to three additional seats in the House of Representatives and seven other states to one more each. Ten states, most of them in the Mississippi Valley area, each would lose one of their House member-

All the calculations were based on existing apportionment laws and final tabulation of returns from last April's census, which showed a total population for the continental United States of 131,669,275. The census counted 122,775,046.

States listed for gains of one House seat each were: Arizona, Florida, Michigan, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oregon and Ten-

Ten States Lose States with similar losses: Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas Massachusetts, Nebraska, Ohio, Oklahoma and Pennsylvania.

The reapportionment would apply to the 78th Congress convening Jan.

Pistol Discharges Accidentally As Veteran Officer Grabs For It; Hope For His Recovery Held By Physicians

"I Dropped My Gun, Grabbed At It, Caught the Trigger And It Fired," Deputy Sheriff Tells Courthouse Engineer Following the Shooting

Deputy Sheriff C. B. Ponder, 57, was shot and wounded seriously today when he grabbed at his pistol as it dropped. The officer was found wounded in the sheriff's department at 10 o'clock by officials and workers in the courthouse who hurried to the office after hearing the pistol

"I dropped my gun, grabbed at it, caught the trigger and it fired," Rann said Ponder told him.

The officer's 45 caliber pistol was in a drawer of the counter in the office. The drawer was partly open. One bullet had been fired. Courthouse officials found Ponder For County Roads on his back on the floor behind the counter. His hat was in his right

The bullet entered above the heart, ranged upward and lodged against his shoulderblade. Physicians expect him to recover. An Ellis ambulance rushed him to the Western Clinic Hospital.



Because most of the bidding systems of contract bridge were created and developed in the East, many people are under the impres-sion that easterners are the better contract players. This may be partly true in regard to bidding, but some of the finest card players in the country are located in the mid-dle west and in St. Louis. The cali-ber of play by the women is excep-

tionally good. Here is an example of fine play that I encountered in St. Louis. This hand was taken from the Western States mixed pair event, which was won by Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Miller of Belleville, Ill. In second place were Mrs. Irene Reardon and J. M. Mathews, Jr., of St. Louis.

The contract was of course optimistic. East won the opening lead and unkindly returned a trump. Dummy won and led a spade, but East was not caught napping. He jumped in with the ace and led a

second trump.

Again declarer won the trick in dummy and led a spade to ruff. A diamond ruff put dummy back to lead the third spade, which South ruffed. When the spade queen dropped, declarer took out the last trump and went over to dummy with trump and went over to dummy with the king of clubs to cash the two good spades.

Minnesota Wins Grid Title As 1940 Mythical Champion

popular acclaim, Minnesota's Gophers have been chosen 1940's leading football team.

So impressive was Minnesota's feat of winning eight consecutive games, all against major opposition, and taking the Western Conference championship, that it wasn't forgot-ten in the rush to hail the seasonclosing feats of such other unbeaten Tennessee.

In the season's final Associated Press ranking roll, the Gophers, who had held the lead for three La Marble, the tennis queen, has preceding weeks, were named for just finished eight weeks of footfirst place by 65 of the 133 participating experts and received no votes below fourth place. They were placed second by 55 voters, third by eight and fourth by five. Last season, they didn't even rate among the first ten.

A&M Down Four Stanford's Pacific Coast cham-pions moved up to second place in the final ranking with 1,125 points, compared with Minnesota's 1,244. Texas A&M dropped from second place to sixth after suffering its only defeat of the season at the hands of Texas. Stanford polled 44

first-place votes, but was rated as low as seventh by some experts. Although Michigan lost to Minnesota by one point, five voters picked the Wolverines for first place, and all regarded them highv enough to earn third place with 914 points. Tennessee and Boston College, both unbeaten and untied and scheduled to meet in the Sugar Bowl New Year's day, wound up fourth and fifth with 885 and 798

points, respectively.

The Texas Aggies, last season's No. 1 team, received just one first place vote and 728 points. Following them were Nebraska, Stanford's Rose Bowl rival, seventh with 514 points; Northwestern, eighth with 323; Mississippi State, appearing in the top ten for the first time, ninth with 233 1/8, and Washington, tenth with 210 1/8.

Other teams figuring in the final ballot were Santa Clara, 198 1/8; Fordham, 157 1/8; Georgetown, 133 1/8; Pennsylvania, 87 1/8; Cornell, 30 1/8; Southern Methodist, 9 1/8; Hardin-Simmons, 9; Duke, 8, and

LaFayette, 4.

The final 1939 ranking was Texas A&M, Tennessee, Southern Cali-fornia, Cornell, Tulane, Missouri, UCLA, Duke, Iowa and Duquesne.




