

On the Tax Trail

The ever-sharpening hunt for more tax money is now blowing its hot breath on the back of the neck of property long considered as tax-exempt because it belongs to religious, educational or charitable institutions.

Such exemption is a matter of state action. States are tightening up. The North Carolina State Supreme Court, for instance, has ruled that property owned by an institution must be used for institutional purposes to be exempt from taxes.

The National Association of Assessing Officers has noted the trend toward such tightening-up, citing properties as valuable as the Chrysler Building in New York, which belongs to Cooper Union and escapes taxes as a result.



Commission Closes In Panhandle Wells With Rest Of Texas

AUSTIN, Dec. 24 (AP) .-- No long er exempt from oil production shutdown days, wells in the Panhandle district of Texas were closed in with the rest of the state's fields today. The Railroad Commission, yesterday boosted to 10 the shutdown days decreed for December and issued a special order voiding exemption for the Panhandle area the remainder of this month and through January The original order, issued in November, called for nine shutdown days each in December and January.



Commission engineers said the state's net allowable last week averaged 1,367,918 barrels daily, or 90,-918 over the U.S. Bureau of Mines demand estimate of 1,277,000. Assigned but unproduced allowables. they added, amounted to about 47, 877 barrels a day, bringing the state's yield down to 43,041 barrels higher than the federal bureau's forecast. The one day's shutdown added for December was estimated as cutting production 15,000 barrels under the bureau's estimate.
