Gulf 17 Waddell Shows Distillate And Gas On Test

Ellenburger Prospect In Southwestern Crane Gauges 6 Million Feet

By Frank Gardner Oil Editor.

Gulf Oil Corporation No 17 W. N. Waddell et al, wildcat in Southwestern Crane -County, today indicated opening of the county's third Ellenburger, lower Ordovician, pool as it showed 6,-000,000 cubic feet of gas and some distillate on drillstem test.

The test was made from 5,602-37 feet, with tool open 45 minutes. Gas volume gauged 6,000,000 feet at the end of 40 minutes, and when drillpipe was broken down it contained 60 feet of fluid, 30 per cent 64gravity distillate and the balance drilling fluid. No. 17 Waddell this morning was coring ahead at 5,644 feet, with another core scheduled to be pulled at 5,645. It went out of the Permian into the detrital zone at 5,538 feet, missed the Simpson, middle Ordovician, and topped the Ellenburger at 5,584 feet, datum of minus 3,121.

The prospect is located 660 fee from the northeast and southeast lines of section 15, block 3, H. & T. C. survey, four and one-quarter miles south by southwest of the South Sandhills Ellenburger pool of

WASHINGTON, March 11.-Congress completed action today on the historic

British aid bill, just after President Roosevelt set \$7,-000.000,000 as its starting appropriation.

This round figure, which would be the largest peacetime appropriation ever requested in America's history, was announced by congressional authorities who met with the President.


He signed the bill at 2:51 p. m. (C. S. T.) today.

The roll call vote which sent it to the White House, was announced as 317 to 71. on House acceptance of Senate amendments.

Mr. Roosevelt is expected to re-quest the \$7,000,000 formally in a special message to Congress tomorrow.

Members of the Congressional delegation at the White House said the money would permit purchase of "all articles authorized in the British aid bill." They were not specific.

The two big developments came on a day that in London air minister Sir Archibald Sinclair told the House of Commons that American warplanes "will get here in time" for the developing battle of the Atlantic, and another authoritative source said "the spring blitz which Hitler promised has begun.'

Prospects of production from the second sand of the Abell pool ap-peared favorable today at Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 State-Sharp when it showed oil and gascut mud on drillstem test. Dry in the upper sand, logged from 5,468-73 feet, the well topped the second sand at 5,915 feet but found it hard and tight until drilling break occurred at 5.932 feet. A core was pulled from 5,932-35 feet, total depth with recovery of three feet of tight oil-stained sand. The core showed no water. Packer was set at 5,912 feet but failed to hold for the first 10 minutes. It then was reset and held, and a 25-minute drillstem test from 5,912-35 showed a steady blow of air and 800 feet of fluid, top 290 feet of which was gas-cut and bot. tom 590 feet oil and gas-cut. Test was through 3/8-inch bottom-hole choke. The well headed when all but five stands of drillpipe had been broken down. Another test is scheduled for the well. 

Speaking Of Aid---

The United States feels uneasy in its present course of sending arms and aid to one party to a war, while still firmly resolved not to take part in the war. It is a new technique, and we tend to think back to days when one was either in a war or not in it. So we feel uncomfortable in the present situation, and shy away from aggravating it.

It is indeed a strange technique. But who introduced it?

The German flyers and technicians, the Italian "volunteers," who helped Franco win the Spanish war, and the Russian technicians and "morale-builders" who helped the Republic lose it, set the pace.

Interesting indeed is the accounting given by the Italian official Stefani news agency of certain details of equipment sent to Franco Spain during the civil war.

There were, Stefani reports, \$375,000,000 in loans, very little of which has been paid back. There were 1900 cannon, 10,135 automatic arms, 7,514,537 artillery shells, 7,668 motor vehicles, and 763 airplanes, to say nothing of two submarines, four destroyers, and four motor torpedo boats. Ninety-one Italian warships engaged in Spanish

In budgeting your eggs, count those eggs used in desserts served during the week. If there are four in your family-two adults and two children-your minimum egg budget should be 14 eggs a week. If you use, for example, the two desserts given below during a week's menu, you use four eggs, so that means you have only 10 more to use for the other meals. It means, also, that getting the family to eat its required minimum quota of nutrient-rich eggs need be no problem at all.

Next time you make a floating island, try making it with fresh orange juice for the liquid. For a pudding with surprises inside, add orange cubes or sections. Pile it in tall-stemmed glasses with whipped cream. Or, turn it into a pie by making it a bit thicker and serving it with cookies as a base, in a glas pie dish. FLORIDA ORANGE MERINGUE

To make meringue: Beat egg whites until stiff, add sugar gradually and continue beating until stiff and glossy. Pile meringue in spoonfuls on custard and top with orange sections.
