Behind The Headlines

Associated Press Staff Writer Japanese Foreign Minister Matsuoka's stop-off in Moscow, en route to visit Messrs. Hitler and Mussolini, strikes me as likely to have a vast influence on Nippon's undecided policy toward Britain and the United States in support of the triple alliance-Germany, Italy and Jap-

Mr. Matsuoka's forthcoming parleys with the Axis chiefs are wide-ly expected to consider the question of whether Japan shall make steps which will involve the question of peace or war with John Bull and Uncle Sam. In view of this I would give a bright, new penny to know what, if any, sign of encouragement or discouragement he is carrying away with him from Soviet Premier Molotof for more active cooperation with the Axis

On Findings Mission The Japanese envoy has come to Europe to see for himself whether the Axis partners are in a position to make good their claim that they can nullity American aid for Britain and knock the latter out. His findings may be calculated to in-fluence strongly the decision of his government as to whether Japan is to continue to weave a tortuous course of non-belligerency or throw caution to the winds and join in the attack on the Anglo-Allies.

Now the Muscovite point of my story is that it won't be strange if Matsuoka imagines he hears the whir of warplane propellers all the time the Axis brotherhood is arguing for Japan's full participation in the war. That disquieting sound will come from phantom Russian bombers, winging their way over the their destructive freight among the paper and match-stick buildings of the Island Kingdom.

That's one of Japan's greatest fears—that if she gets involved in the Western war, Russia will take opportunity to settle old scores. And Nippon's constant nightmare is the frightful devastation which could be wrought throughout the country by bombers. Apart from this, Japan doesn't of course, overlook Russia's big standing army in Siberia or the great fleet of sub-marines at Vladivostok.



of a changing world can reverse it utterly.

This happened in America. When the present war broke out in Europe, most Americans were not only indifferent, they were bitter toward both sides. Disillusioned by the shattering of the dream of the "War To End War," they wanted no part of this one.

Eighteen months passed. The stand the United States has taken today is a simple reflection of a change in the mind of the American people that is in itself almost a

When the Fascist party seized power in Italy, Americans shuddered at the end of representative government, of-civil liberty. But they shrugged, "It is Italy's own af-

When the Nazi party rose to power in Germany, Americans were revolted by the bullying braves, the concentration camps, the book-burning, the racial swaggering, the war on races and religions. But they shrugged, 'It is Germany's own affair.'

When Fascist revolution broke out in Spain, and was pushed rough-shod by foreign aid to victory, Americans

For example, one of the finest card players in the United States today is Henry Chanin of Atlanta, He plays in only a few tournaments a year, but you will always find his name up near the

In the summer session of the Nationals, Chanin was on the win-ning mixed team-of-four and was second in the men's pair event. In the fall session of the Nationals, he was runner-up in the open pair championship and right up among the leaders in the team-of-four. In the South, he played in four tour-naments last year and was a winner in each of them. That's a truly great performance in anybody's rating

Chanin gives his opponents the impression of being a careless or indifferent player, but today's hand shows how outstanding his skill

The opening lead was won in dummy with the king of clubs, and a trump led to the ace. Chanin led the four of hearts and the king was allowed to win. The second heart was led and West's ace took the queen.

Farmers To Receive OUR used oak desks, chairs, and Globe Wernicke book cases. Phone Cotton Stamps After (13-3) Performance Check

Cotton order stamps, to be earned by farmers for participating in the supplementary cotton program, will be issued this summer as soon as possible after performance is checked under the 1941 AAA farm program, according to M. W. Whit-mire, chairman of the Midland County AAA committee.

In the early cotton-producing counties of Texas, issuance of stamps may begin in late June, with the bulk of the stamps expected to be distributed during July and August. Samples of the tamps have been sent to the Midand AAA office. Whitmire said this estimate i

pased on past experience in checking cotton performance during a normal growing season. A late growing season in 1941 would delay issuance to farmers in the areas affected. Cotton stamps will be issued to farmers who make a further volun-

tary reduction in their cotton acre-

age in 1941. Stamps can be used to

ourchase cotton goods in local re-

ail stores. Farmers may earn stamps at the rate of 10 cents a pound on the normal cotton yield of the acreage eduction. (A farmer interested in only one farm may earn a maximum of \$25 in cotton stamps, except that an operator with two or more tenants or sharecroppers may earn up to \$50. A farmer interested in two or more cotton farms also than \$25 of this amount can be on any one farm.)
