U.S. Ships Will Carry Cargoes To **Important Canal**

Chief Executive Hints Supplies May Find Way

To Belligerent Allies

-President Roosevelt today reopened the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden to American

The Chief Executive announced at a press conference that he had taken out the stopper from the mouth

The ships will be permitted to go and Gneisenau to be sheltering. all the way to the Suez Canal, since Egypt is neutral territory. While American vessels are not permitted under the neutrality act to carry war supplies to belligerents, the President made it clear that cargoes destined for a neutral country could be carried up the Red Sea and Gulf

And, he indicated, there will be no tendency on the part of the gov-ernment to explore the question of whether supplies consigned to neutral might ultimately get to belligerent Question Is Involved.

As a matter of fact, the President said, he was not sure whether, under the neutrality act it was forbidden for supplies sent to a neutral to reach belligerents ultimately.

The question, he said, brings up all sorts of things, so he would hate to say yes or not. Mr. Roosevelt made it clear that American vessels could use the Suez

Canal, since only the Mediterranean Sea, of the waters in that area, re mains in the restricted combat zone. Ships could not sail out of the canal in to the Mediterranean.

Mr. Roosevelt explained that, technically, the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden were not considered a combat area but that a strip of water from the easternmost port in Africa to Arabia had been designed as a region which American vessels



Salute To Greek Freedom

Just 120 years ago this spring, Greece was launching a fight for freedom which roused the admiration of the world. Lord Byron in England, Dr. Howe in the United States, the poet Mueller in Germany, sang the praises of Greece bravely taking its stand and dying to gain freedom from the Turkish aggressor. Today a new Turkey may stand at the side of Greece against another aggressor.

Our great-grandfathers heard of the defense of Missolonghi, the massacres at Chios, and Greece became a synonym for freedom wherever free men met. It took 10 years, but in 1830 the independence of Greece was won.

Today, 120 years later, the world again salutes Greece because, with Finland, it dared to stand against overwhelming aggression and speak a "No!" that rings defiantly across a yes-world.

The Quality Of Mercy

"I charge you solemnly swear to receive kindly and protect those Italians who may surrender to you without arms and not to retaliate with the cruelty that they inflicted upon our people, but to show yourselves to be honorable, humane soldiers.'

That is from a proclamation reported being circulated by Haile Selassie among his Ethiopian troops, looking toward the complete collapse of the Italian conquerors of Ethiopia. Whether it will be carried out, time will tell. Certainly it will not be easy to restrain the Ethiopian warriors in whose memory the bombing of their own native huts is still fresh.

Yet what a reproach to the "civilized" nations of the world it would be if the very tribesmen of Ethiopia should show a quality of mercy of which their erstwhile conquerors, representing "the new order" knew nothing!

The Draft In The Future

As things stand today, we may as well look forward to the draft, to selective military service as a permanent part of the civil obligations of all male citizens.

Therefore, it is worth while to look at the draft as we have seen it work out thus far, and consider how it will probably be modified in the future. First, it is now clear that as enough trained reserves go back into civilian life to make a backlog of safety, the age limits will probably be dropped. After all, the time for a young man to do his military service is when he is young, before he has gotten a fair start on his civilian career and his family life. Further, between the ages of 18 and say, 23, he has a longer period of years ahead of him in which he will be fit for

These things are for the future, since today the imperative need is for a trained reserve, but it seems likely that it is the direction the future military service laws will take.


