Dead And Injured Uncounted As Aid Is Rushed To Stricken Communities; Half Of Colima's Residents Homeless

By The Associated Press

MEXICO CITY, April 16.—Thousands were homeless and the dead and injured still were uncounted today as the government rushed aid to stricken cities and towns of seven states in the wake of devastating shocks in Mexico's southern earthquake belt yesterday.

Communications were crippled and the full magnitude of the property destruction and human toll, especially in the more remote sections, may not be known for days.

Colima, capital of Colima state, * 275 miles west of Mexico City, appeared to be hardest hit of the towns able to communicate with the capital. Governor Pedro Torres Oritz radioed that half of the city's 15,000 residents were homeless, dead or injured. Colima volcano, near Colima,

erupted, Governor Ortiz said, kindling forest fires that seriously men-aced the shattered city.

The temblor, which began with violent shocks lasting five minutes in Colima, tapered off in a series of lesser tremors, apparently centering in the historic earthquake center of Chilpancingo, about 50 miles inland from the Pacific coast resort town of Acapulco.

When Human Beings Are Junk

There is always apt to be a trace of tragedy in an auction room. Things are being sold for what they will bring, things that somebody prized once, and worked and planned to possess, and which no one else will ever, perhaps, prize so much.

Most tragic of auctions, however, was held the other day at Staten Island, New York. The United States sold a warehouse full of pitiful household objects sent here by people who had hoped to get out of Europe, who never made it.

Some of the boxes had been piling up for two years or more, storage charges unpaid, taking up room that had to be found for new boxes. Egg beaters and rolling pins, pieces of silver, things valuable and worthless, useful and pitifully useless. But the people who sent them were unable to follow. So their belongings became junk, sold for storage charges and to make space.

That is sad enough. But what of the human hearts that beat so high with hope when those boxes and packages were sent to America? They are junk, too, human junk, rotting and wasting away for lack of means to come to the land where they might have a chance of freedom and hope.

Thousands are standing on the piers at Lisbon, waiting for the ship that does not come. Other thousands are in France and Germany and Austria, in every land where the Nazi boots have trod, condemned as human junk to rot in ghettoes or concentration camps, or simply to wait without help or hope.

As they have fled from country to country in an effort to keep ahead of the Nazi legions, time after time those legions have caught up with them, subjected certain ones to summary punishment, others merely to abandonment in that vast human junk yard which Adolf Hitler has made of half of Europe.

But ships to Lisbon, last "escape-hatch" of Europe, are few and far between. Even those who have run the whole gauntlet, and arrived at Lisbon with all proper credentials, have no assurance of flight to the New World. to army duty And any day the hob-nailed boots may come tramping into Portugal.

Surely it must be possible to do something to reclaim this human junk. They are people, men and women and children who live and breathe and feel and think and who perhaps have not ceased entirely to hope.

A way was found to put to use the goods they sent before them. Can not the New World find a way to use their lives as well?

They are a part of the \$3,300,000 worth of new defense airports which to stay at home or prosecute them are soon to dot Alaska and link it to Canada and the

Mile-long runways required by modern bombers are not easily or quickly built. So when one realizes that this program got under way only last fall, it gives hope that real progress is being made. The United States is determined to defend its uttermost boundaries and to reach out its defensive arm in every direction from which attack might come. Justice Hughes is wise in years and in experience, in learning and in life. He proved it on his birthday.


Straw On Winds Of Change

No. According to a group of United States industrial research experts now in South America, this model textile mill is on the outskirts of Santiago, Chile.

That is significant. It heralds the coming South America, which will not only be a producer of raw materials, but a processor. This trend is inevitable, though it may cut into North American markets for certain distributors' goods. And this model mill uses all North American cotton, and nearly all North American machinery. South American industry is going to be built in any event, and thus it is a pleasure to see it being built with North American aid and co-operation.





Conditions were said to be very good for growth of range feeds Grass was beginning to green in the northwest district, and supplemental feeding was expected to stop during the next week or 10 days In the east and southeast districts, warmer weather during the week caused rapid improvement in ranges and cattle were putting on

flesh, it was said. Goat shearing was nearing completion and sheep shearing was becoming active. Sheep were putting on flesh rapidly, according to the report, and heavy shipments of grass-fat yearlings were expected by May 10.

LAMPSHADES CAN BRIGHTEN DULL CORNERS

You can brighten up the most hopelessly gloomy corner with a colorful lampshade. Odd bits of fabric, preferably some high-twist woven cotton, are suggested for the shades.
