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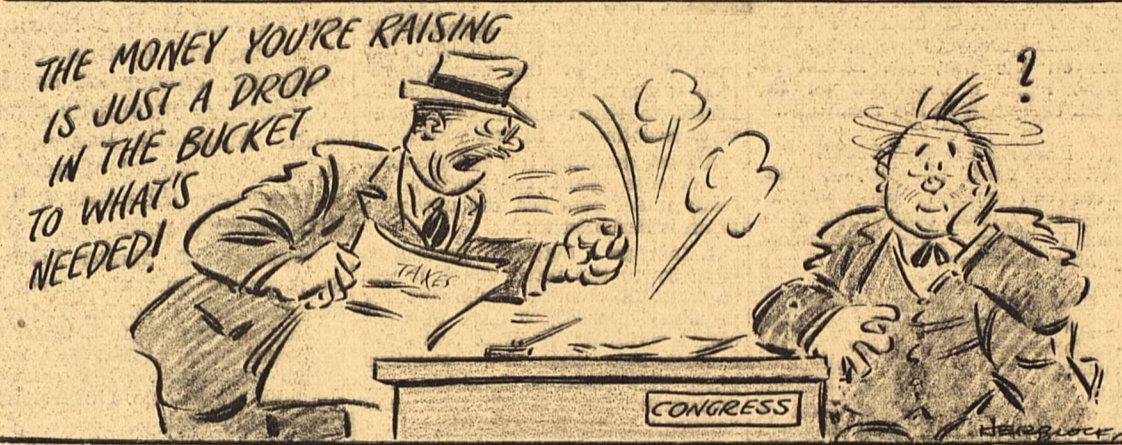

Philippines' Army Goes Through Paces

MANILA—(UP)—The Philippine army has engaged in its first island-wide mobilization and maneuvers in two years, with 30 specially detailed U. S. army officers assisting in the 10-day training.
 Other groups of American officers were scattered throughout the island acting as observers and taking notes on weakness and strength of the trained Philippine Army reserve in anticipation of the time when they would take over active command and direction of the 150,000-man Philippine Army in event of a Pacific war. Major-Gen. George Grunert, commander of the Philippine department, U. S. Army, also observed the maneuvers.

Chilean Journalists Work On U. S. Papers

 Seven Chilean newspapermen who have worked for nearly six weeks on important New York, Washington, Boston, Philadelphia, Detroit and Los Angeles newspapers, are on a wide tour of the United States before returning home next month.
 The journalists are engaged in a new experiment in inter-American relations, one that may be repeated in the future with newspapermen from other American republics. All are working newspapermen. They include reporters, city editors, cable editors, men who make their living by gathering news and preparing it for the reader.
 With but one exception, none of the men has been in the United States before. Through their brief visit they have been able to view the North American scene from a closeup vantage point.

Enlightened Policy

The problem of public relations of an army is always difficult. In the case of a democratic army in a democratic country it is even more difficult.
 Yet in essence it is simple, too. It is a pleasure to see that Maj. Gen. Robert C. Richardson, Jr., the army's chief of publicity, has grasped the essential truth. "Sometimes we are inclined to feel," he told a meeting of army publicity officers, "that a certain happening would make adverse publicity. Do not try to suppress it. It is better to have it aired in full than to let it become surrounded by a haze of mystery, gossip and rumor. The American public has a right to know what its sons in camp are doing."
 It is reassuring to see a man with such sound principles in charge of army publicity.

The Road North

The United States' determination to defend itself by defending the Western Hemisphere has been punctuated by the securing of outposts, even in Greenland. The Alaskan and Caribbean outposts hum with activity. We join hands with Mexico and Canada in defense measures.
 But the project for an overland road to Alaska lags. A shipping crisis looms up before a startled world. What would become of our Alaskan outpost if it should suddenly become hard to find ships to supply it?
 The answer is the overland road to Alaska to be built jointly with Canada. The International Highway Commission which is planning it now urges speed. A treaty with Canada and \$25,000,000 are what's needed. It is hard to pick any one defense project at similar cost which would contribute more to American safety in time of war, and more to American welfare in times of peace, than this road. Why delay further?

There have been dances for the army's recruits at Camp Lee, Va. But they haven't been 100 per cent successful, according to report.

The Richmond defense unit's chaperon club decided the trouble was there weren't enough girls—and so they have set out to enlist 1000 Richmond girls, over 18, to be known as the Girl's Defense Club.

The girls are to aid their country's defense program by dancing with homesick trainees. Not all the thousand will get bids to every dance—but they are to come tripping to their country's defense whenever needed.

It's a fine idea—except for one thing. The girls are volunteering. And it would be better if they were drafted, like the young men.

That way, there would be all types of girls, and if the army didn't find them all to its liking, it could train them, just as it is training the country's young men.

As it is, probably the only girls with nerve enough to volunteer for the Girl's Defense Club are the pretty, peppy, popular girls who are already good dancers and don't really need to meet young men.

If the girls were drafted, there would be all types. If necessary, the army could provide classes for the poor dancers, to get them up to army requirements.

It could train the tongue-tied, shy girls (if there are any like that in the South) in the frivolous art of flirtatious conversation.

TRAINING WOMEN IN NATIONAL DEFENSE

The girls who don't know how to dress to please a stag line could be enrolled in a course in "How to Dress."

That way, the young women would be getting some of the benefits of National Defense.

And if the army is willing to spend millions to train young men, it ought not to object to spending a little more to train girls to play a feminine role in national defense.

No woman ever will be truly chic until, in her own mind, she has a clear picture of the way she wants to look. And even after the imaginary picture is firmly set, she'll never achieve her goal unless she first admits that it takes plenty of time and lots of energy to be chic and then reorganizes her daily schedule accordingly.

Going to the hairdresser for a new, more flattering, smarter cut and shopping carefully for the perfect suit are steps in the right direction, of course. But no more than that.

Keep Hair Well-Groomed
Being chic means taking excellent care of that coiffure, going to the hairdresser at least once every six days—often if the hair is oily or limp and soft and difficult to manage. It means making sure that every item in the spring and summer wardrobes is just as perfect as was the Easter suit.

More means resolving to be smartly turned out every hour of every day—not just now and then on special occasions. It means learning to wear a simple dress with that certain air that spells chic, whether it's a gingham house dress or a simple office frock.

Thailand Still At War; Is Neutral

BANGKOK, April 17—(UP)—Although Franco-Thai hostilities have ceased, Thailand is still at war—fighting to maintain a policy of strict neutrality. Thailand has become a battlefield upon which the democracies and the totalitarians are struggling for influence.

The acceptance of Thailand and Indo-China of Japanese mediation of their border dispute brought the fight into the open. Totalitarian propaganda issued by the German and Japanese legations here was parried by Allied propaganda issued by the British legation, and vice versa.

When Japanese warships entered the Gulf of Siam and four Japanese destroyers appeared in the Menam Chao Phya, which flows through Bangkok, British troops were moved into fortifications built in the south along the Malayan-Thai border. Similar action was taken by British forces in Burma from the Shan States to the Kra peninsula.

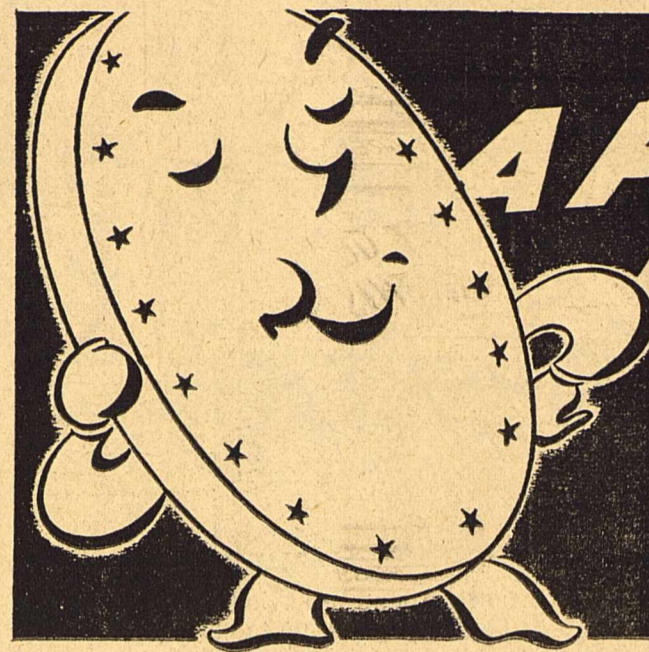

Heltman said there are about 1,300,000 persons in the United States who stutter. The ratio is one stutterer among every 100 persons.

Indian 'Reign Of Terror' Figure Goes On Trial With Life In Balance

TULSA, Okla., April 24 (AP)—Ernest Burkhardt, a central figure in the Osage Indian "reign of terror" murders which shocked the nation in the early '20s, went on trial for burglary today, with his life's freedom at stake.

The Osage County rancher was given a life sentence for the dynamic slaying of W. E. Smith, one of the victims of a murder ring which the government charged had killed a dozen oil-rich Indians in an effort to gain control of their fortunes.

After pleading guilty, Burkhardt assisted the government in convicting W. K. Hale, "king of the Osages," as the master mind of the murder plots. For this, a parole was recommended by federal attorneys but was not granted until 1937.

Federal authorities pointed out today that under the terms of Burkhardt's parole he must complete his life sentence if he is convicted of any crime.

It is important to get the diamond suit started before declarer can establish dummy's good clubs, and North should consider the possibility that South's holding may prevent him from leading diamonds.

Of course, the diamond return by North defeats the contract, as the declarer has to win the first diamond lead with the ace or king, leaving South with the queen and jack. All the declarer can do is to cash his ace and king of trumps and then lead clubs.

South wins with the ace and immediately leads the queen of diamonds knocking out declarer's high diamond. Declarer tries to ruff his clubs, but North ruffs with the high spade and South still has a winning diamond trick. Thus the contract is defeated.

Houston Will Assume Post Actively But Is Uncertain On Issues

By William T. Rives.
HOUSTON, April 24—(AP)—Texas' 86-year-old appointee as interim Senator—fervent General Andrew Jackson Houston—intends to assume his post actively.

Full of spunk and slightly irked at reports the suddenness of his appointment had resulted unfavorably upon his physical condition, the son of immortal Sam Houston declared he felt "tip-top" and would leave for Washington probably "within a week."

In his first interview since Governor W. Lee O'Daniel appointed him Monday, General Houston said he was uncertain when he would take the oath of office.

"I can't say—just any time," he

said.
The octogenarian's voice, coming over the telephone from his home 25 miles from Houston, sounded strong and clear.

General Houston, believed to be the oldest man ever appointed or elected to the national Senate, said he would not be a candidate in the special election set for June 27 to determine who will fill out the unexpired term of the late Morris Sheppard.

He reported he was writing a history of the Republic of Texas and "simply wouldn't have the time."
He said he favored aid to Britain, but "wouldn't know" whether the United States should enter the war on the side of England.

He was not certain of the attitude of his constituents, he said, "and I must wait until I get to Washington to learn the sentiments of Congress and the sentiments of the President."

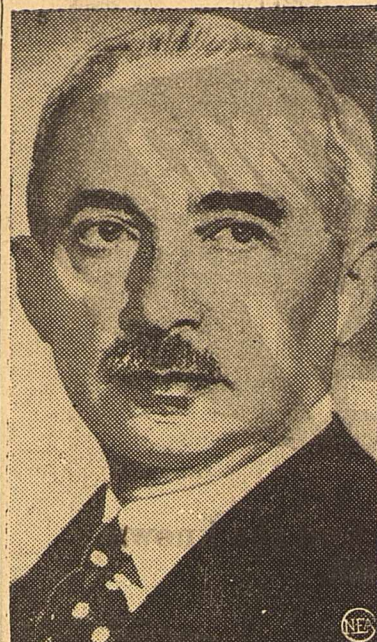
Washington Watches Three Prominent Turks For Course Country Will Take In Rapidly Progressing Balkan War

WASHINGTON, April 24—The words and actions of three aging Turks—all big town men by contrast with the bulk of their fellow citizens, who are simple, rugged peasants of the Anatolian plateau—are being sharply watched in Washington diplomatic circles for a cue to Turkey's course in the raging Battle

of the Balkans.

The men with the tremendous responsibility of gambling on war or peace for Turkey are Ismet Inonu, who succeeded the late Mustapha Kemal as President; Reyfik Saydam, the Premier; and Marshal Ferzki Cakmak, commander of the army. All three of them have seen service in the Balkan wars, the World War and the subsequent war when the Greeks invaded Turkey in Asia. All of them served side by side with German officers in World War I when Germany and Turkey were allies, and so all of them are familiar with the German technique of warfare.

President Inonu was born in the great Asia Minor port of Smyrna in 1884. His father was a judge. He himself attended Turkish military schools and, when still very young, was named an officer in a field artillery regiment.

By the time he was 24, he was commander of an army corps. Like Kemal Pasha, he served gallantly in the first World War. After the Allies won, Britain, France and Italy sought to impose their own kind of treaty upon Turkey, a treaty which was accepted by a puppet Sultan but rejected contemptuously by Kemal Pasha and his friends, among whom was Ismet. They rebelled.

When the new Turkey was set up, Kemal Pasha became President and Ismet was made Foreign Minister and later Premier. Upon Kemal's death, the National Assembly in November, 1938, elected Inonu as President. It was the universal feeling that this staunch friend and right arm of Kemal was certain to carry on the policies of his dead comrade.

Dr. Saydam, the Premier, was born in Istanbul in 1881. Just as many Turks studied military matters in Germany, so Saydam studied medicine there. Soon celebrated as a physician, he was made a chief medical officer with one of the Turkish armies. Live Inonu, he stood side by side with Kemal in the fight to make a new Turkey.

For 17 years after 1921 he served as Minister of Health and did much to improve sanitation and hygienic conditions not only in the new capital of Ankara, but in all Turkey. When Inonu became President, Saydam became premier.

Marshal Cakmak is also an Istanbul man, born in 1876. His ancestors were all army men, and he followed the family history, becoming a lieutenant in the Turkish army in 1895. In the Balkan wars he fought on the Serbian front.

In the World War he had command of an army which defended the Dardanelles and later fought in the Caucasus and Syria. After the World War he was successively, Chief of the General Staff, Minister of War, Minister of Defense and, now, Marshal in supreme command of the Turkish armed forces.

MYRTLE'S IN CLOVER NOW.
OLDEST MULE IN ARMY
FORT HUACHUCA, Ariz. (UP)—Myrtle, the oldest mule in the army, is the only packmule left on this southwestern military reservation.

The long line of stables which once housed hundreds of mules used in pack trains and transportation of supplies, is empty, and only Myrtle, 38 years old and now retired from active duty, remains.

The aged mule will be allowed to spend the rest of her life on the reservation and will appear only in reviews and parades, bedecked in a special blanket purchased by enlisted men.

Morning Cheer Is Helped By Fluffy Muffins

Spicy muffins are a spring tonic for the family breakfast. They are also good nutrition. The eggs, shortening, milk, flour (all important foods), plus sugar, spices, nuts or dried fruits, combine to produce a sturdy breakfast item.

Spiced Fruit Muffins.
(6 Large Muffins)
Two cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/3 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, 1 teaspoon cocoa, 1/2 cup chopped uncooked prunes, 1/2 cup chopped walnut meats, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 4 tablespoons shortening, 6 cooked prunes, 6 walnut halves.

Sift flour once before measuring. Sift together flour, baking powder, sugar, salt and spices. Mix in chopped prunes and nut meats. Combine well beaten eggs, milk and melted shortening; add to flour mixture, stirring only until dry ingredients are thoroughly wet. Fill six heat resistant glass or tin custard cups two-thirds full. Top each with a cooked prune stuffed with a walnut half. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) about 30 minutes or until golden brown.

Cinnamon Fluff Coffee Cake.
Two-thirds cup sugar, 1/2 cup butter, 2 eggs, well beaten, 1 cup sour milk, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 tablespoon cinnamon.

Cream the butter and sugar together, then stir in the eggs. Sift the flour before measuring, then sift together three times all the dry ingredients. Add these alternately with the milk and beat one minute. Put the mixture in a buttered baking dish and put aside until topping is made.

For the topping, mix together 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon butter and 1 tablespoon cinnamon. Spread this over the batter and bake in a medium oven (350 degrees F.) for about 1 hour, or until a tester comes out clean. Cut in wedges.

Corn Muffins.
(Serves 4 to 6)
One cup corn meal, 1 1/2 cups sifted flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 2 to 4 tablespoons sugar, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, well beaten, 1/4 cup melted shortening, 1 1/4 cups milk.

Sift dry ingredients together, combine eggs, shortening and milk. Combine wet and dry ingredients quickly, beating barely enough to mix. Pour into hot buttered muffin pans and bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 20 to 25 minutes, depending on size of pans.

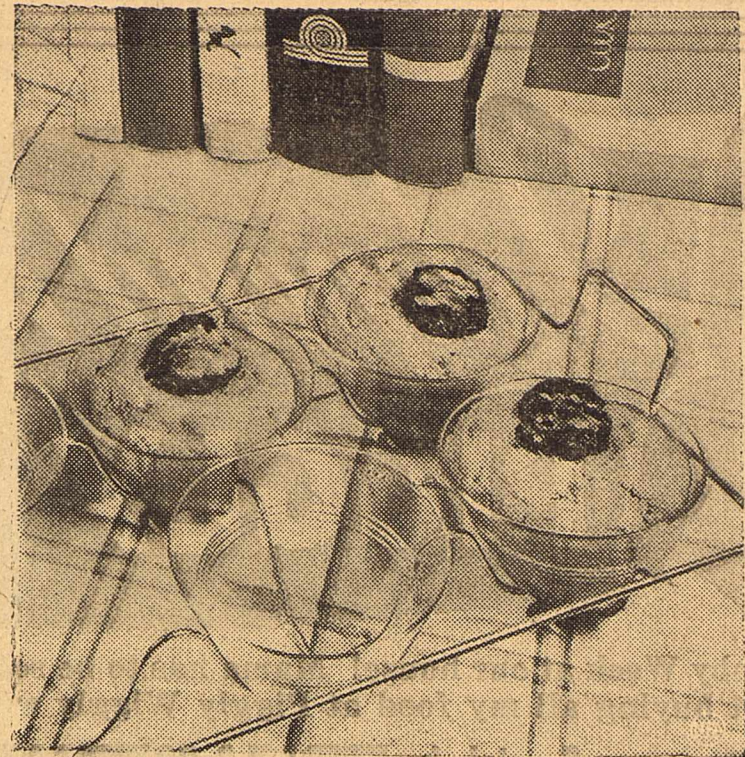

"They are weakest in the legs," Beise observed, "and legs are what they will have to use the most."

LOS ANGELES.—(UP)—Five hundred classes are now being maintained in Los Angeles County alone for the training of skilled workers for the national defense industries, according to Homer C. Petty, vocational director for the Los Angeles County Schools. The greatest problem is that of training workers for shipbuilding.

MCCAMEY, April 24—(Special)—The final tabulation of the 1941 scholastic census shows 713 for the McCamey Independent School District. Of this number, 683 are white and 30 negro children. The total is 57 under 770 of 1940, and 134 under 847 for 1938.
The attendance at the close of school in May of 1939 was 793 and at the close in May of 1940 733. It is 675 now.
There is a slight increase in the enumeration of six-year olds with 60 for this year and 47 last year.

British May Use Whale Food For Nazi Blockade

LONDON.—(UP)—A proposal to sweep up whale food from the Atlantic and utilize it for human consumption in an effort to beat the German counter blockade has been made.

The knowledge gained was that the same amount of water can be supplied through smaller water mains by proper arrangement of sizes to equalize the pressure.

VATICAN CITY, April 24—(AP)—Pope Pius XII asked Catholics throughout the world to pray for peace—the third such appeal of his Pontificate.
The appeal, made in the form of a letter addressed to Luigi Cardinal Maglione, Papal Secretary of State, asked Catholics to devote the month of May to peace prayers.

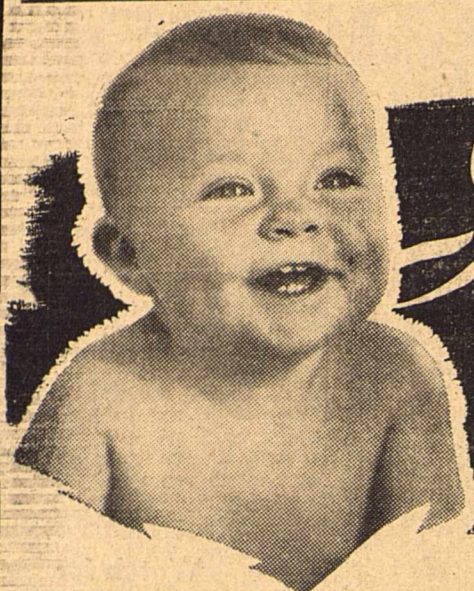

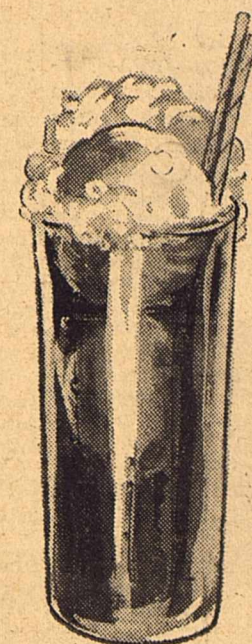

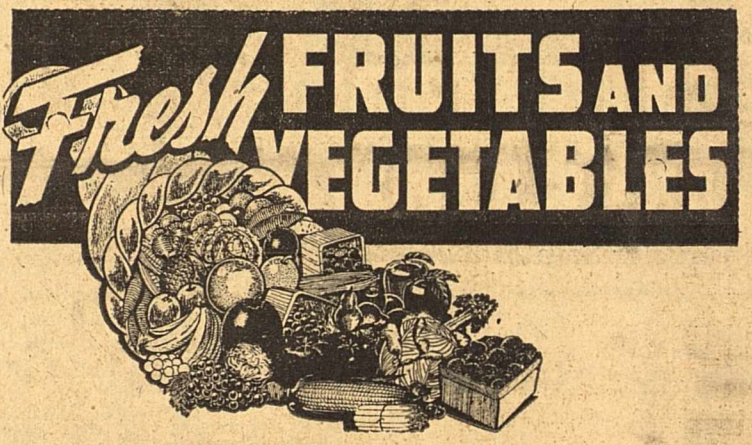
