Lloyd George Demands More Aid Knox Declares U. S. Navy Is Ready To Go

Secretary Makes Comment At Press Talk And Lauds Stimson's 'Courageous' Speech; Navy Takes Over Coast Guard Activities

WASHINGTON, May 7.-Secretary Knox said today that the Navy is "readier now than ever" to undertake the job of assuring delivery of war supplies to Britainif and when it is assigned to such duty.

The Navy Department chief made the statement at a press conference in commenting on a speech last night by Secretary of War Stimson in which Stimson advocated use of the United States Navy to assure a victory for Britain in the battle of the Atlantic.

At the same time, Knox disclosed that the navy was taking over "the seagoing activities" of the coast Pro-Nazi Premier

guard. Knox was asked by reporters for comment on Stimson's plea for naval

action "right now" and he said, "1 thought it a forthright, courageous and very enlightening talk animat-ed by a high spirit of patriotism." Shortly before Knox's press con

ference, Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) announced that Chairman Emory S. Land of the Maritime Commission had informed him that "only eight out of 205 ships that left our ports with supplies for England were sunk in the first three months of this year."

While Knox was talking the White House announced that President Roosevelt had signed an annual navy supply bill totaling \$3,415,-521,750.

Another development was approv-al by the House naval committee of legislation authorizing a \$57,750,000 air craft station development program for use by naval patrol blimps. Quoting a letter from Land, Van-

World War Premier Gives Britain Verbal Lashing And Warns Of U. S. Production; **Commons Votes Confidence In Churchill**

Not Satisfied

LONDON, May 7.--Winston Churchill won today from the House of Commons a tremendous 447-to-3 vote of confidence despite a strident charge from David Lloyd George, World War premier, that "America has got to do more" if she is to enable Britain to beat Germany.

The white-haired elder statesman, in his most outspoken utterance in many months, warned the government against exaggerating the speed or amount of United States aid and declared American war organization traditionally is "full of disappointments" for the British.

He demanded a "real war cabinet" and "an end to the kind of blunders which have discredited and weakened us. However, Lloyd George cried:

The World Has Caught Up With Us

Isolation is a part of the American dream. A great part of the people who came to this country from abroad from 1607 to 1941-a long time, mark you-came to get away from something. They came to get away from religious persecution, from useless war, from economic disstress. For a long time America was a haven.

Today America is a part of the world. It does not matter that we do not wish it so. It does not matter that there is a little particle of tradition down in the bottom of every one of us which cries protestingly, "No, no!" It is true. Science, that obliterator of time and space, has brought the world into a unity. There is no place that is today "out of the world"-not Tahiti, not the mountains of Ecuador.

One may regret this, but it is true. Nothing could be more hopeless than to base action on what used to be true, or on what we wish were true. Greenland was once remote, an unreal plaything of explorers. Today it is a stepping-stone for bombers, a danger, and the United To Wed Rush Holt States had better "be there first," no matter what the cost. For whatever that cost might be, it is less than the cost of yielding, without a struggle, the outer rampart. A prominent Broadway leader of the show world has

a motto, and it isn't a bad one for nations, too. It is, "Don't kid yourself." That is what we are doing when we try to reassure ourselves that the United States can go one, unmolested, to achieve a destiny separate and unique in an interlaced world. It can't be done any more, if it ever could.

The change is a change of this century. It is during the past 30 years that transport has speeded up; until then, men traveled at scarcely greater speed than the Romans. The world in which the United States was able to win the revolution (with the invaluable help of a French fleet) continued down to World War days. It was not until after that war that U. S. Navy NC-boats made the first Atlantic crossing by airplane. The world grew smaller then, the world changed, more than it had changed in a similar period since Salamis.

There is no salvation for the United States in mental retreat to a dream of childhood, any more than there is for an individual.


