President Roosevelt Orders Troops Into

LOS ANGELES, June 9-(AP)-Production was resumed today at the North American Aviation Company, its officials announced. There were 1210 workers at their jobs after army troops wrested control of the strikebound plant from 1000 CIO pickets.

President Roosevelt ordered the Army today to take over the strike-closed North American Aviation Corporation's huge warplane plant at Inglewood, Calif., in an effort to end the tie-up of production in airplanes.

The President's announcement came shortly after disorders broke out at the plant as some workers tried to return to their jobs despite a CIO strike.

It was the first time the government had taken such a step to handle a strike situation.

"Where were you when the 'Tuscania' went down?" Soldiers in rough banter used to shout that at one another in 1918—a gentle reproof from the old-timer to the new recruit. It was the soldier equivalent to "What did you do in the Big War, daddy?"

Some day, maybe soon, similar questions are going to be asked again.

"Where were you," it may be asked, "when the United States was declared to be in a state of emergency, and the hard-pressed British waited for the planes and tanks that might have saved them?'

Some, it would seem, will have to answer, "Oh, I was out on strike for \$1.40 an hour instead of \$1.35! I was listening to speeches by leaders who were interested in other things than the republic's success."

Or, "I was fighting the Wagner act—you know, that law that provided for collective bargaining back when the government trusted to management and labor to have the wit to settle their differences without risking national
