Stiffens French Resistance For **Allies Invasion**

British And Supporters

Storm Damascus Defense As Germans Raid Haifa

By The Associated Press

Adolf Hitler's Luftwaffe has entered the battle of Syria, it was indicated today, stiffening French resistance against the Allies' 4-day-old "loud speaker" invasion even as British and Free French troops stormed at the outer defenses of Damascus, the Syrian capital.

Censored dispatches from Damascus said Vichy French troops were being supported by unidentified air force units which yesterday attacked Haifa, in British-mandated Palestine.

Coincidentally, the German high command reported that German warplanes, operating from "new bases," raided Haita yesterday. The British said the German base

was at Aleppo, Syria. In the battle of the Atlantic, the

Nazi high command said the German navy and air force had sunk a total of 2,235,000 tons of British shipping during the first four months of 1941.

French reports said Vichy troops, ranying against the British-Free French invasion, had executed a successful counter-attack to check Allied forces driving toward Damas-

(Written for NEA Service) When Foch was dying he exhorted France to "send for Weygand" whenever she felt herself to be in danger. When the Syrian situation became critical, this lean, lithe man barely five foot four, with his thin lips and restless eyes set in the parchment-like skin of his small aristocratic face, whipped over to Vichy from Africa. There can be no doubt that he threw everything he had into a final attempt to prevent Petain putting into effect Darlan's plan for full cooperation with Germany and the free use of Syrian and perhaps other French naval air bases in North Africa and elsewhere. Weygand has royal blood in his veins and the keenest sense of honor it is possible to conceive. He is a most devout Catholic, goes to mass every morning if he possibly can and is a stern, almost brutal disciplinarian, not only with his subordinates but with himself. He is impressed with his own importance, and since the collapse of France which he was powerless to avert (he was only given command of the French armies on May 20th, six days after the Germans had smashed Corap's army and broken through at Sedan.) Weygand must more than once have dreamed of coming back at some critical time of the war, to retrieve his military reputation. Like Petain, Maxime Weygand profoundly distrusts politicians, es pecially those of the Laval type. He has never been on especially good terms with Admiral Darlan, for the French Army and the French Navy are intensely jealous of one another, and Weygand looks upon himself as far better suited than Darlan to take Petain's place as head of the French State. Now that Laval has won over Darlan to his pro-German policy, Weygand's opposition is bound to become more bitter.



But should Weygand be able to halt the Darlan-Hitler plan, there is bound to be renewed tension between Germany and France which may result in events taking an unexpected turn in this war so full of uexpected developments.
