The state chairman of international relations has planned the seminars and will be present at them.

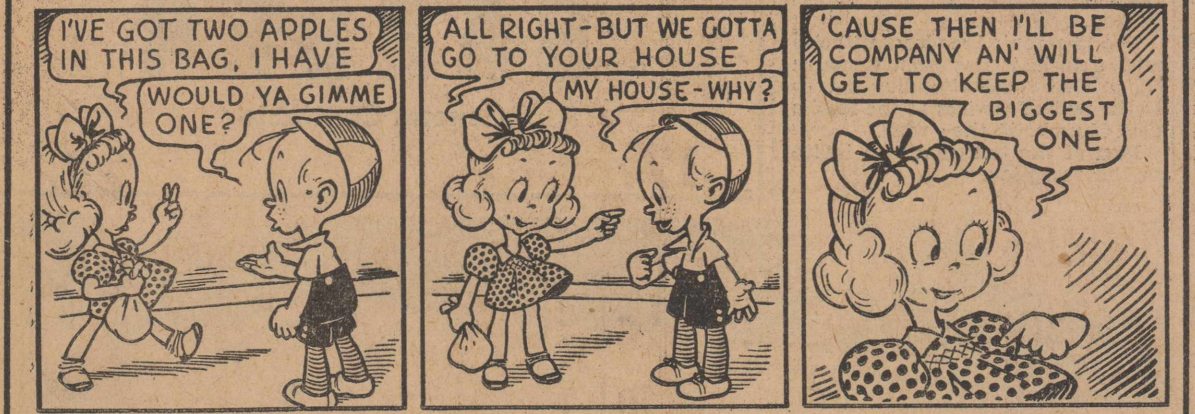
The two-day session is open to all clubwomen and they may stay in the college dormitory at very small cost, club officials here have been informed.

AUSTIN, June 12-(AP.)-On a basis of preliminary estimates by the state tax board, intangible assets of oil and gas pipe lines, railroads and toll bridges in Texas totaled \$80,494,000 for 1941, and increase of \$1,631,100 over 1940.

The asset estimates, made public yesterday, were computed as the difference between the physical and going concern values of companies and will be supplemented later by similar assets of bus and truck companies.

Selective Buying Bill Meets Defeat In Senate
AUSTIN, June 12-(AP.)-Boosted more than \$5,000,000 over current appropriations, a bill authorizing expenditure of \$22,602,069 on higher education institutions in Texas the next two years today awaited state Senate action.

The Senate concluded its day's stint without acting on House amendments to an appropriation of \$1,750,000 monthly in June, July and August for old age pensions to avert a cut in payments.

Another attempt to consider a House-approved bill designed to eliminate asserted selective buying of crude oil met defeat in the upper legislative branch.

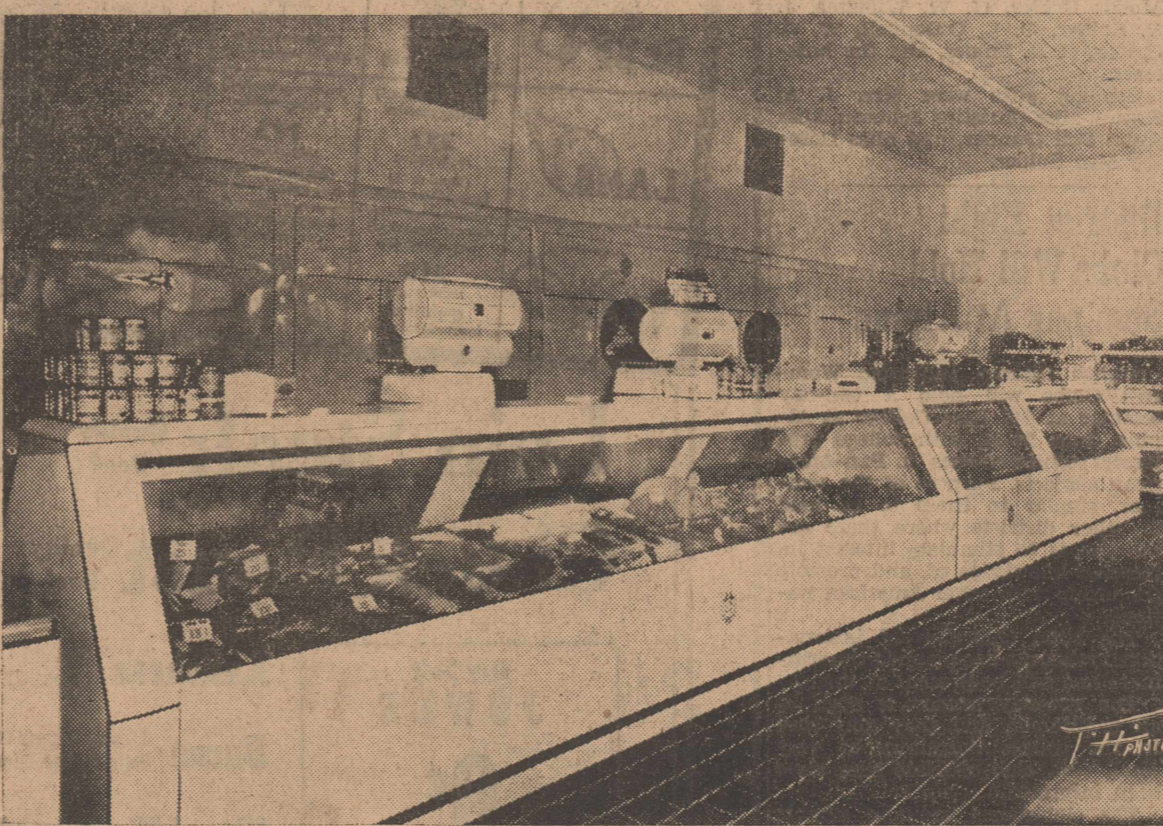

Production Strike Threats Diminish

The mushroom outbreak of defense production stoppages and strikes threats of the last week diminished appreciably today, but left a growing controversy over proposed drastic governmental measures to curb their recurrence in strategic industries.

Resumption of work at near-normal capacity on warplane parts in five Detroit plants of Bohn Aluminum and Brass Company and six Aluminum Company of American units in Cleveland was scheduled for today after short-lived CIO strikes.

At Inglewood, troops guarding the plant were augmented yesterday by armored cars and mechanized cavalry forces.

OLIPHANT, Pa., June 12—(AP)—An argument over the refusal of his 14-year-old daughter to dance with him led Steve Hosa, 46, a coal mine motorman, to kill his wife and himself with a pistol in this Southwestern Pennsylvania town early today, Deputy Coroner R. L. Sharp reported.

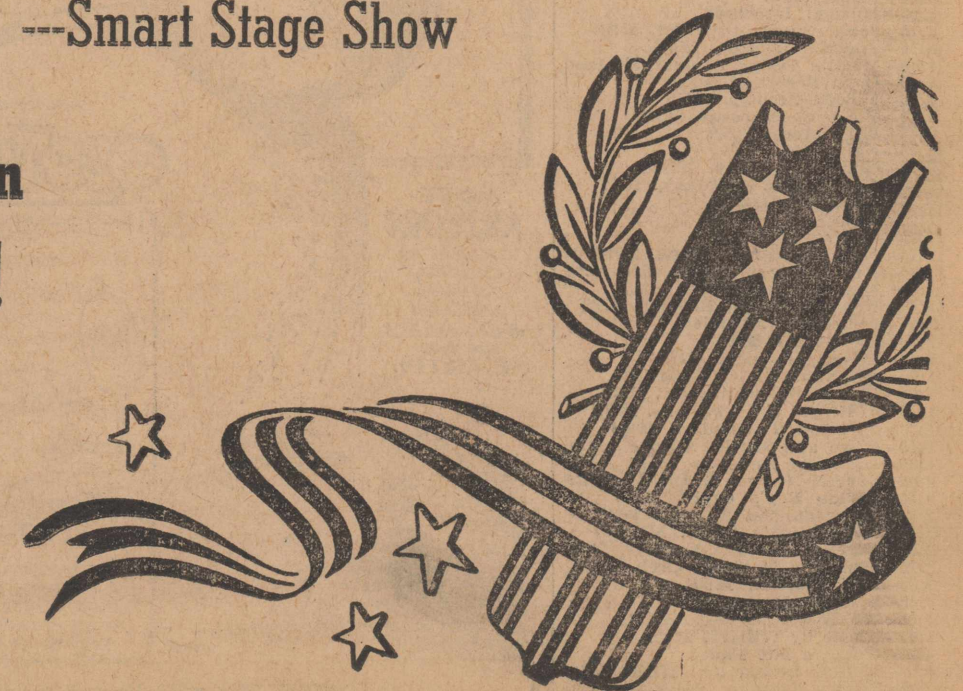
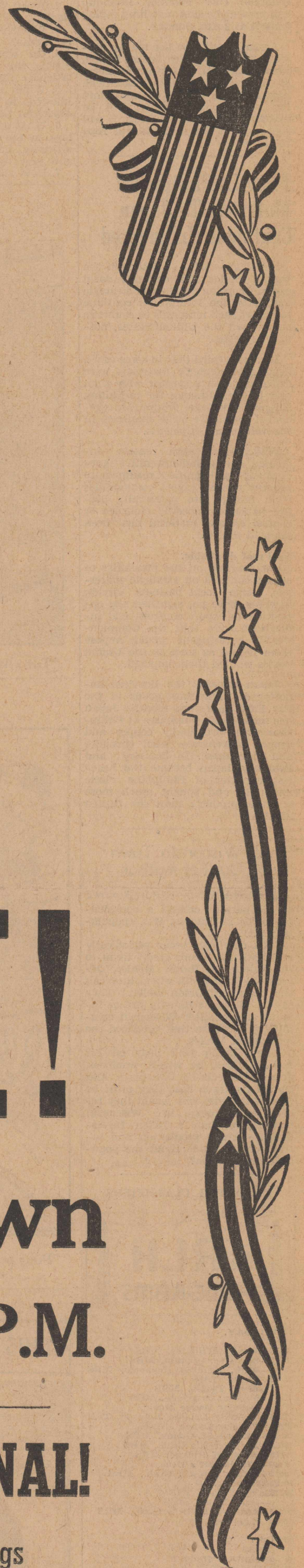

Flow Of Philippines Materials To Japan Continues Unhindered

MANILA, (UP)—Although the United States has clamped down export licensing controls on strategic materials, the Philippines continue to export such materials to countries other than the United States, notably to Japan.

It was revealed that in some cases, exports of strategic materials were being made on a greater scale than ever before, although the prevailing shipping shortage presumably precluded unusually large increases in the volume of shipments.

While Washington reports indicated the Commonwealth government had signified readiness to prevent certain export commodities from falling into potentially hostile hands, no specific embargo or control on any material has been imposed thus far.

No Proof Available. Commenting on the possibility of export controls on strategic materials, some local business circles, however, have not signified any opposition to export controls, and indications were that the Commonwealth government would impose them if and as soon as the United States wanted them imposed.

Japan remains the heaviest importer of Philippines goods in the Far East. In recent months Japan has made heavy purchases of Philippine ores, principally copper and copper concentrate, iron, chromite and manganese. In January and February Japan became the heaviest importer of Philippine base materials, and bought much more of these products than the United States.

Small Wisconsin Town Turns Out For Author

BATAVIA, Wis. (UP)—A crowd of 500 persons creates a conspicuous bulge in Batavia, Wis. (population 151).

Such overflows occur periodically and Batavia citizens credit them to the talent of Ralph Mehlos, 24-year-old farm youth whom they call the "Barnyard Orson Welles." They say he will make Batavia just as famous as her sister Wisconsin community, Kenosha that produced the real Orson Welles.

When Ralph isn't busy on his father's farm, he writes, produces, acts and directs his own plays. And Batavians argue that they must be good. Otherwise why would they receive more notice in Wisconsin newspapers than a Helen Hayes-Maurice Evans production and attract crowds three times the population of Batavia?
