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Roosevelt Nominates Stone For Chief Justice Of Supreme Court Headlines

President Names | New Appointments Jackson, Byrnes To Other Places

South Carolinan Gets Senate's Confirmation Soon After Selection

By The Associated Press WASHINGTON, June 12. -President Roosevelt today nominated Harlan F. Stone of New York to succeed Charles Evans Hughes as chief justice of the United States.

The place vacated by the elevation of Stone will be filled by Attorney General Robert H. Jackson. And, to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of James Clark Mc-Reynolds last February 1, the Chief Executive nominated Senator James Francis Byrnes of South Carolina.

On the motion of Senator Glass (D-Va), Byrnes' nomination was confirmed 11 minutes after it had reached the Senate. This is a courtesy customarily extended sitting members of the Senate when they are nominated to the judiciary.
The nominations of Stone and

Jackson were referred to the judiciary committee for consideration in the usual course of procedure. Hughes Asks Retirement.

Although no immediate announcement was made as to who would succeed Jackson as Attorney General, there have been reports that Francis Biddle, solicitor general since January, 1940, probably would be moved up to the highest justice

Chief Justice Hughes submitted to the President ten days ago a request that he be permitted to retire as of next July 1 and Mr. Roosevelt accepted it with regret. While there had been reports that Jackson might become Chief Justice. Jackson might become Chief Justice,

the President chose instead to elevate Associate Justice Stone, a Republican, to the highest judicial post in the nation. Stone will be 69 next October. Jackson is 49 and Byrnes is 62. With confirmation of the nomi-

nations by the Senate, Mr. Roosevelt will have named seven of the nine members of the Supreme Court which he once wanted to increase in size to inject new blood. Stone Was Supporter Both Jackson and Byrnes are

AUSTIN, June 12-(AP)-Preindustry rests largely with Texas oil men and the state Senate in the opinion of Railroad Commissioner Jerry Sadler now in Washington.

Sadler asserted yesterday, in a statement to his Austin office, that Texas, California and Illinois had better "get their houses in order" if they expect to avert federal con-

Consular States Commander Knew Ship's Country

Early Declares Report On Robin Moor Will Be Studied Before Action By The Associated Press

The State Department announced today that an American consular report stated the United States ship Robin Moor "was undoubtedly sunk by a German submarine" in the South Atlantic and that the commander of the Nazi U-boat "was fully aware that the vessel was

American. Presidential Secretary Stephen Early said in Washington that the report would have to be studied fully before any course of action was determined.

In Berlin, Nazi spokesmen have been wary of commenting on the sinking, declaring yesterday that reports on the case were "confusing, unclear and contradictory."

It was the first torpedo destruction of an American ship since the World War. Eleven survivors have reached safety so far. Thirty-five others are missing.

Amid this ominous developments in relations between Germany and the United States, Prime Minister Winston Churchill told a conclave of Britain's Allies in London that every stain of Adolf Hitler's "infected and corroding fingers will be purged and if need be blasted from the surface of the earth."
Representatives of 15 Allied gov-

ernments or governments in exile, in the first formal meeting since Hitler's legions swept clear across Europe, solemnly pledged them-selves to fight "until victory is won." "Hitler will find no peace, no rest, no halting place, no parley," Churchill declared.

Flow Of Philippines Materials To Japan Continues Unhindered

MANILA.—(UP.) — Although the United States has clamped down export licensing controls on strategic materials, the Philippines continue to export such materials to countries other than the United States, not ably to Japan.

It was revealed that in some cases exports of strategic materials were being made on a greater scale than ever before, although the prevailing shipping shortage presumably precluded unusually large increases in the volume of shipments

While Washington reports indicated the Commonwealth government had signified readiness to prevent certain export commodities from falling into potentially hostile hands, no specific embargo or control on any material has been imposed thus far.

No Proof Available.

Commenting on the possibility of export controls on strategic materials, some local business circles however, have not signified any opposition to export controls, and indications were that the Common wealth government would imposi them if and as soon as the United States wanted them imposed.

Japan remains the heaviest importer of Philippines goods in the Far East. In recent months Japan has made heavy purchases of Philip pine ores, principally copper and copper concentrate, iron, chromite and manganese. In January and February Japan became the heaviest importer of Philippine base materials, and bought much more of these products than the United




