## Permian Basin Oil Top Red Soldier Is Sufficient For **National Defense**

Need Of Pipeline Or More Tankers To Move Crude To East Told


Rich oil reserves of the Permian Basin Monday were called to the attention of Federal Petroleum Coordinator Harold Ickes and government officials in Washington who are threatening "gasless" Sundays and other curtailment of petroleum products during the "unlimited National Emergency.'

The tremendous reserves of the Permian Basin, North Texas, the Texas Panhandle and New Mexico are available and sufficient for national defense needs, a number of West Texas oil men pointed out at a luncheon All-Out Efforts here. A group of the oil producing members of the Permian Basin Association desire to focus attention on the oil reserves of North and West Central Texas (860 million barrels), West Texas (21/2 billions), Panhandle of Texas (690 million) and New Mexico (700 million), being a total of nearly five billion barrels out of total national reserves of 20 billion. It is pointed out that. the bulk of this oil moves into the Gulf Coast bottleneck and in keeping with the national defense program a portion of this available production could be moved by a new pipeline extending from a point in West Texas through Wood River and on to the Eastern Seaboard and thus supply crude oil from which both gasoline and fuel oil can be produced. Much of the production in this province is severely curtailed and a new outlet can easily be supplied without physical waste.



## **Aggressors' Non-Aggression Treaties**

Turkey is reported to have signed a non-aggression treaty with the Germans.

Well, well! Now the Turks may sit back and relax in the smoke of the Turkish pipe-dream that has turned to a nightmare for so many others. For instance, these others

POLAND, which signed a non-aggression pact with Germany on Jan. 26, 1934, and was invaded by Germany Sept. 1, 1939.

ESTONIA, LATVIA, LITHUANIA. They signed nonaggression treaties with Russia April 4, 1934. They were bodily taken over by Russia June 15, 1940.

FINLAND, which signed a non-aggression treaty with Russia April 7, 1934, was invaded by Russia Nov. 28, 1939.

DENMARK, which signed a non-aggression pact with Germany May 31, 1939, and was swallowed up by Germany April 9, 1940, just a few days more than a year later

The signing of a non-aggression treaty with an Axis power has become, within the last few years, the political equivalent of a marriage to Bluebeard, and if Turkey enters the Axis harem, it might do well to glance sideways at the bones of those who have gone before.

One of the worst things about this war is the monumental hypocracy of it. Non-aggression pacts, sacred promises not to invade or attack one another, followed swiftly by the very attacks forsworn.

#### Major Dent Studies Motorless Flights At New York School

Mrs. Fred R. Dent, who is visiting her mother, Mrs. Jonn D. Robinson in Midland, and who is related to J. F. and C. B. Haley, also of Midland, has a special interest in aviation

Her husband, a major is one of six U. S. Army Air Corps pilots enrolled in a school being conducted by the Elmira Area Soaring Corp. in Elmira, N. Y. The school will evaluate the results of motorless flight instruction and may prove a guide for the future of the air

Major Dent is assistant chief of the aircraft laboratory at Wright Field, Dayton, O. He has flown here many times and is a nephew of the Haley brothers. Helped Build Glider

He graduated from West Point with the 1929 class. His first service was in Honolulu. Later he became an instructor at Randolph Field. He studied aeronautical en-gineering at Boston three years. The group of power plane pilots is making extensive studies of glider flights and motorless aviation. Dent's experience with gliders dates flights back to 1931 when he helped build the ship in which Lt. William Cocke established a world's record. Dent in a recent newspaper inter-

view opined: "If the Air Corps embarks upon a large program of glider training it is uncertain whether a school will be set up with students of the present courses as instructors or whether the work will be "farmed out" to a civilian organization.



## Happiest Chandler Ancient Bastion Thrills Again To **Emotion Of War**

SAN ANTONIO. — This ancient bastion of military power, which more than two centuries ago royally conved the King of Spain is again served the King of Spain, is again thrilling to an old emotion—war. In all the U. S. there is no greater concentration of men, materials work and authority than in the nine military establishments ringing old San Antonio.

There are four armies in the United States and one is headquartered here.

There are three army air training centers and the biggest is concentrated here.

Thus perhaps more than a quar-ter of all U. S. field effort to be-come militarily supreme in a world of warriors has its origin and impetus in this glamorous old city of 300.000

Posts Busier Today. This seems completely natural to San Antonio, which since the days of the Spanish conquerors (starting about 1691) has been a strong-hold for military men. It's an old story for this town but the thrill is still

Each camp, fort, air field and headquarters is busier today than it has been since the helter-skelter days of 1917-18.

At Randolph, Kelly and Brooks fields great batches of new fliers, fast of reflex, quick of eye and long on courage, are turned out every five weeks.

This doesn't mean that more men are concentrated here than anywhere else. Army establishments like that at Fort Bragg, N. C., have far more soldiers than the grand total of all fields around San Antonio, which is something over 30, 000.

It means that San Antonio is the heart and brains of a fourth of the continental U. S. Army and at least a third of its air training effort.

Being one of the soldiers assigned to holding down the Greeks is going to be one of the lesspleasant assignments of the war. It may even prove, in some cases, definitely unhealthful.






