I was asked recently if there are any outstanding women bridge players coming along. If Mrs. Wilkinson Wager of Atlanta, Ga., and Mrs. J. E. Folline of Richmond, Va., get to the nationals in Asbury Park this summer, put it down in your little book that one of them will be found among the year's national champions. Mrs. Folline participated in the world championship Masters individual tournament this year and managed to win a top score in one of the five sessions. She is neither a timid bidder nor timid player, as you can see from today's hand. South made a nice play on the first trick by following with the queen of diamonds instead of the ace. Mrs. Folline (West), with iron nerve, held up the king. South cashed the ace and knocked out the king. Mrs. Folline led a spade, and the king was allowed to win. Back came a club, and again the king won. Now the four hearts were cashed, dummy discarding the eight of spades, and South found it impossible to hold his second stopper in both black suits. Mrs. Folline developed a ninth trick for the contract.

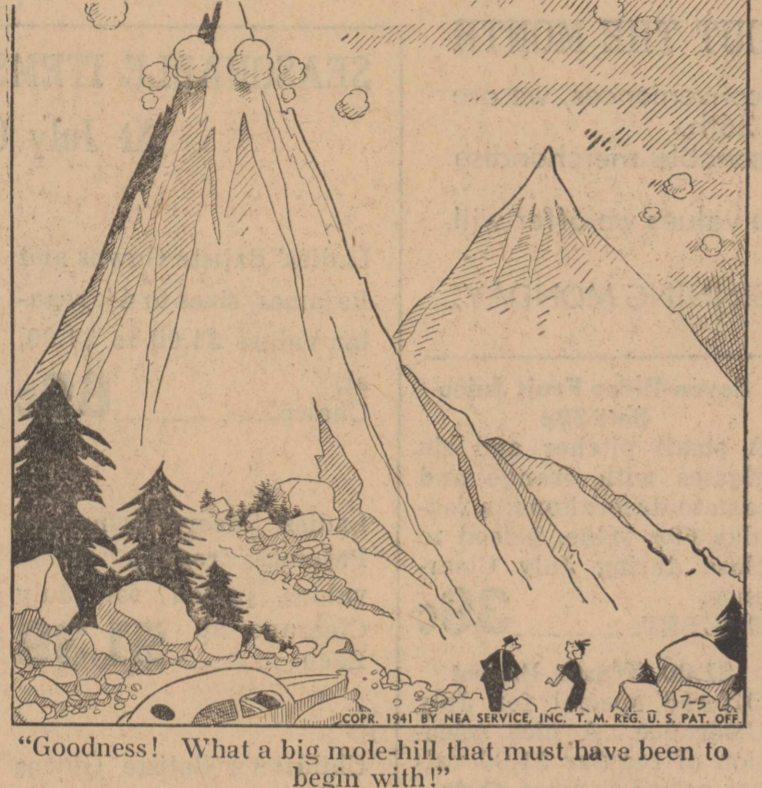
Route Carrier Dies In Airplane Plunge

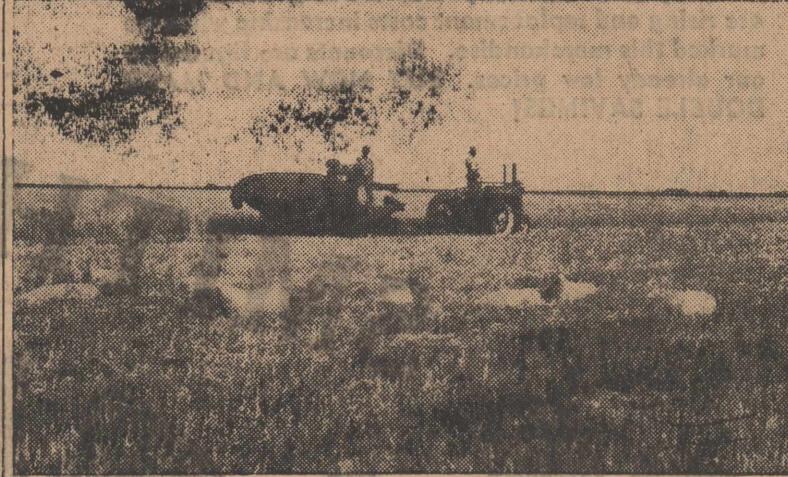

### Coal Operators And CIO Union Workers Work On Agreement

The apprehension of defense officials over a new stoppage in soft coal production faded Saturday as spokesmen for the United Mine Workers (CIO) and the Southern soft coal operators sat down to draft a contract.  
The meeting was presaged by comment from both UMW President John L. Lewis and L. Ebersole Gaines, representing the operators, that the negotiators to that point had shown progress—the first time either side had evidenced such view.  
The operators already had waived their one-time insistence on a 40-cent a day differential between the \$7 a day paid by northern mines and the southern rate, that left comparatively minor details to be worked out in the written contract.  
**Wanted Bargaining Rights**  
Another immediate strike threat vanished when the AFL Chemical Workers Union agreed to shelve an order for its members to walk out of the Western Cartridge Company's Alton, Ill., plant on Sunday midnight. The union and the company accepted a recommendation by the defense mediation board that they negotiate meanwhile con-

### Expects FDR To Settle Question On Price Fixing

WASHINGTON (AP)—A usually well-informed member of Congress said Saturday that President Roosevelt probably would settle next week a controversy between administration officials and leaders on Capitol Hill over the question of enacting price-fixing legislation.  
This informant said Leon Henderson, chief of the government's price-fixing set-up, was urging Mr. Roosevelt to recommend mandatory price-fixing to Congress promptly. Henderson recently said "the honeymoon is over" so far as voluntary government-industry cooperation to fix prices was concerned.  
At the Capitol, it was reported some White House lieutenants wanted the President to delay any recommendation for price fixing. They believed it was said, the legislation would stir up a long Senate controversy and prevent a projected rest period for the chamber while the House is working on the next tax bill.

### West Texas Chamber Seeks Participation In Defense Projects

ABILENE (Special)—Organization of the West Texas territory for participation in national defense contracts is actively under way, said an announcement Saturday from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.  
The regional chamber has been designated by Chas. R. Moore, coordinator, and A. J. Langford, district manager, of the Dallas Federal Reserve office of defense contract service as assisting organizing agency for West Texas, D. A. Barden, WTCC manager, announced six area meetings for manufacturers and fabricators.

Wednesday at San Angelo.  
Thursday at Brownwood.  
Friday at Waco.  
Langford will be the principal speaker at each meeting giving information on how prospective bidders on defense contracts may qualify themselves. Round-table discussion will follow. With the federal government establishing priorities on raw materials for defense purposes, and extensively contracting for defense supplies, the area meetings will bring discussion of proposed formation of pools of manufacturers and fabricators for bidding on prime and sub-contracts.

The first work of the area offices will be to assist defense contract service in qualifying manufacturers, fabricators and machine shops for bidding on defense prime and sub-contracts, and to disseminate information to manufacturers on government contract needs and lettings.

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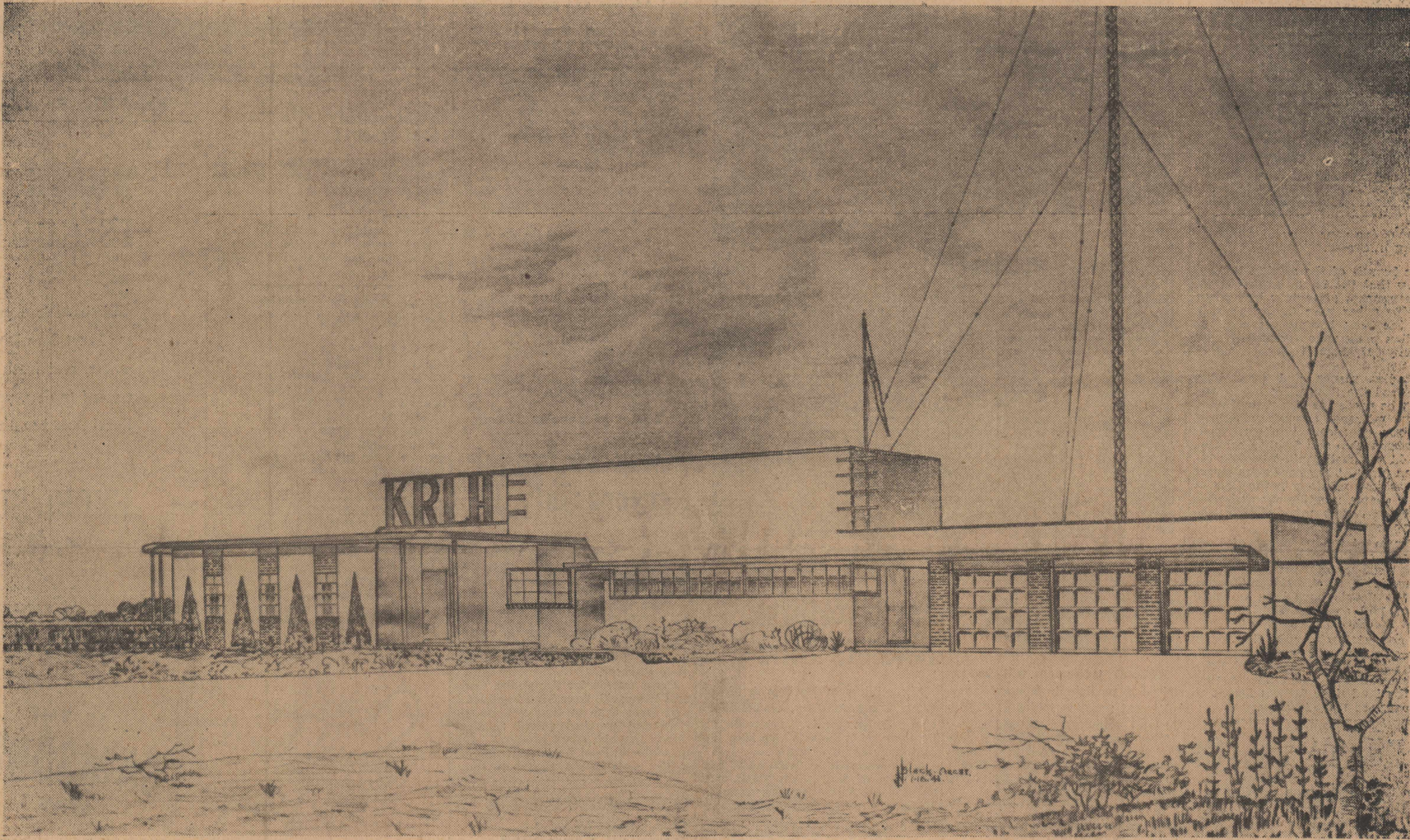
