Sedan Runs Into Rail Embankment West Of Midland

Three Of Victims Are In Serious Condition; Skeen Boy Unconscious

Four Midland youths were injured, three seriously, when the heavy sedan in which they were riding ploughed into a railroad embankment about one mile west of the city at 11:50 p.m. Saturday night.

Curry Skeen, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Skeen, was thrown from the automobile. He was unconscious early Sunday at a Midland hospital. He suffered severe facial and head cuts, body bruises, and other lacerations. His exact injur-

ies had not been determined. Melba Clendenen, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Clendenen, received a broken right leg, deeply gashed left arm at the elbow, and



De Brinon States Vichy Government Accepts New World Order And Policy Incompatible With Britain And U.S.

Declares Collaboration With Germany Is No Business Of Roosevelt And Welles As Four Officials And Weygand Confer On Situation

VICHY, Unoccupied France.—Fernand de Brinon, envoy of the Vichy government in occupied France, declared Saturday in an interview in Paris, made public in Vichy, that France has decided to accept the German version of the new world order as opposed to that of Britain and the United States.

As the interview was made public there was considerable speculation on the results of the day-long conference here among Chief of State Marshal Philippe Petain, Vice-Premier Jean Darlan, General Maxime Weygand, pro-consul in Africa, and Defense Minister Gen. Charles Huntziger on the future of the French empire.

The New Competition

Silk mills are now added to the plants that have to shut down for lack of raw materials. The jobs of as many as 200,000 may be endangered in the auto industry if production is shut down 50 per cent because of lack of metals. Aluminum plants making kitchen ware, silver-plating plants, face contraction, perhaps closing, for lack of their basic metals. Throughout smaller industries the pinch is

Needless to say, the government is going to do all that it can to see that ways are found to keep these plants open, by giving them contracts for defense materials, by reducing their supplies of metal and material as slowly as possible.

But the government can't guarantee to do this in every case. The defense program is a great national effort, and it comes first. It doesn't matter much whose fault it is that there is a shortage of certain basic materials. The fault. in any case, is probably spread widely over a great many people and factors. But it is a fact.

Face to face with the fact, what is American business going to do? It could whine and say, "The government is doing this to us, let the government find the way out." But business won't do that, if we know American business. It is not "the government" that is doing these things. It is the Private Industry American people, acting through their government.

First it must conserve such material as it has, and by ingenious use warning that homes for defense big type. 



In my opinion Burnstone was always one of the greatest match point players in the country. Certainly his team, the Four Aces, has won more team-of-four championships than any other team. Today's hand helped Burnstone and his teammates win the All-Western team event.






