MOSCOW. (AP.) -Soviet cavalry under the famed horseman, Marshal Semeon Budyenny, has been thrown en masse into the Ukraine fighting, a front-line dispatch in Pravda reported Monday riding swiftly to the hottest sectors and then dismounting to fight as infantry.

# Justified, But Unfruitful Resentment

If there is one keynote in the way Americans are thinking these days, it is probably resentment.

It is pretty late in the day for that, but it seems to linger deeply in the American mind. We resent the fact that Europe and Asia went to war at all, disturbing the peace of the world. We resent the fact that it should be necessary for Americans to do military service; resent the fact that now it seems necessary for them to do more of it than was at first hoped. We resent higher taxes and priorities, and the inability to buy silk stockings. We resent not being able to burn all the gasoline we would like to burn, and we resent being called upon to give up this or that little convenience. We resent being disturbed; after all, we want only to be let alone. Why does the world insist on intruding upon us?

All that is natural and human, not merely American, but it is getting very late for us to indulge in it. The more we sit back and allow ourselves to stew in this resentful mood, the more we blind ourselves to reality. The Norwegians, and the Dutch, and the Danes and Chinese and Greeks didn't want anything from anybody, either. Many, many of their people were resentful, too. By what right Government Presses did these turbulent ruffians come pouring over their borders-people who they had never injured, people with whom they wanted no trouble? By no right, clearly-and yet they came.

This is no plea for taking the world as we find it. As we find it, it isn't good enough. Our job is to make it better.

But it is as we find it, and it will not be made better by a sullen resentment which smoulders and glows, consuming fruitlessly energy and constructive spirit, until the heart is ashes and all driving force is gone. The world will be made better only by resolute determination to stand up against "a sea of troubles, and by opposing, end them" -never by an inert and brooding resentment against "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune."

Resentment against an existing situation is a barren and fruitless emotion. Nothing was ever changed for the better simply by resenting it.



TOKYO (AP)-The government put Japan on a full economic war footing Monday under the general mobilization act and authoritative quarters declared only two steps remained before a possible actual break with the United States.

But strangely, amid the atmosphere of deteriorating Japanese American relations, came the counsel of a Japanese diplomat, Kaname Wakasugi, homecoming minister at the Washington embassy, that "the United States is prepared and determined to meet the worst even-





Today's hand incorporates a difficult defensive play, but I am sure that if it were tested on a group of San Francisco players, all would make the correct play. West leads the seven of clubs as an exit, rightly fearing that a spade lead would give declarer his ninth trick.

South takes his ace of clubs and four diamonds. West discards the five of spades and East lets go his two fours. Declarer then cashes the queen of clubs and leads a small heart toward dummy.

West realizes that declarer, with eight top tricks, is probably planning to use the heart suit to force West into lead spades. If West play lows, dummy will take the ace and lead another heart, and then no defense could stop game But West forestalls the situation by playing the king of hearts, to leave himself two small hearts for Now declarer cannot make the contract.

## Former Wall Street Financier Is Paroled

OSSINING, N. Y. (AP)-Richard Whitney, who lost \$11,000,000 in Wall Street, left prison walls a free man Monday after making a profit of \$181.01 in 40 months in

The 53-year old former president of the New York Stock Exchange paroled after serving three years and four months of a 5-to-10 year sentence for stealing \$214,000 from client brokerage accounts, was met by his brother, George, in a chauffeur-driven limousine.

Whitney greeted his brother, a J P. Morgan partner who advanced \$2,600,000 of his own fortune in a vain attempt to save Whitney's firm from bankruptcy in 1938, with a silent handclasp. Neither spoke until the big car pulled away from the prison to carry Whitney to the Barnstable, Mass., dairy farm which he will superintend.
