

Nipponese Refuse To Let American Liner President Coolidge Pick Up 100 U. S. Citizens Trying To Leave

Soviet Government Reports Fighting On Wide Front Is Still Active And U. S.-Made Bomber Beats Off Seven Fighters Of Nazi Luftwaffe

By The Associated Press

The Soviet government which Saturday accepted the British-American offer of maximum material assistance in the battle against Germany reported Sunday that fighting was still general along the whole 2,000-mile front at the start of the ninth week of the Nazi invasion.

In return for the promised help Russia was reported to have pledged active aid in a "stop Japan" movement. The British again were active in daylight raids on Nazi-occupied France. American-made fortress bombers flew in the attack on Brest

and one was reported to have beaten off seven German fighters, returning safely although damaged and with some of its crew wounded. The British claimed to have shot down 19 German planes and admitted

The imminent possibilities of the Pacific situation were further accented when the United States Department of State announced that Japan had refused to let the liner President Coolidge pick up about 100 American citizens seeking to leave Japan. Prepares Siberian Attack Soon

In London, where the Russian promise was reported by an authoritative source, it was said that Japan might stop short in her southward expansion and make an early push at Siberia to help herself and her German Axis partner by blocking the U.S. supply route to Vladivostok.

High Japanese, German and neutral quarters in Shanghai already had said Japan was preparing for a possible attack on Siberia within two or three weeks. If started later, it might be hampered by bad weather, they In the German invasion of Russia, entering its ninth week Sunday, the Red Army was fighting a dogged battle of withdrawal on the southern front in the Ukraine while apparently preparing for a stand on the east

Russians and Germans agreed on the fury of the fighting, but neither side gave official details. German military accounts claimed all the Ukraine west of the Bug River was virtually encircled and that dive bombers were wreaking havoc in and around Odessa

The Germans admitted the Russians were defending themselves sternly saying that as an example of the no-quarter type of fighting, 800 Russians out of 1,000 were killed in one small skirmish In the north, both the Germans and their Finnish allies claimed con-

tinuing progress. The Germans said they had about cleaned up Estonia and were pressing on nearer to Leningrad, while the Finns reported capture of Sortavala, railway city north of Lake Ladoga

U. S. Interest In Peace Proposals

Have the salt ready. There are going to be a good many peace proposals floating about, some advanced in good faith, some less disinterested. Each will need a pinch

The United States is properly interested in these proposals. Some of the most violent of isolationists are actively interested in them. Even profound disinterest in the war does not preclude eager interest in the peace. It matters to the United States, and it matters deeply, what kind of peace proposals are made. The United States is not in the war, and has not the slightest right to dictate to either side what peace measures it might advance or accept. But the United States is in the world, and it is affected (as every one of us knows now) by whether Europe and Asia keep the peace.

The reason for the salt is this: The just and workable peace that is the only kind worth making is scarcely within sight at a time when one side in a war holds all the chips. The big winner in a poker game is usually willing to call quits when the stack of blues in front of him rises formidably. But the other fellow insists on playing on, hoping for a change of luck.

As Woodrow Wilson said, "Only a peace between equals can last." Until both sides in this or any war see themselves as equal in power or potential power, there is no "negotiated" peace; there is only a peace of compulsion, recognizing ill-gotten gains, frustrating legitimate

A peace, for instance, "legitimatizing" the conquest of small peoples by aggressive warfare, is no peace. A peace leaving Europe or Asia in a precarious balance between vast militaristic forces ready to spring at one another whenever the chance looks good is no peace. A peace which assents to any nation or system using the rest of the world as a mere spawning place for its propaganda and intrigue is no peace. A peace which denies ccess to the world's raw materials on equal terms to all is no peace. A peace without an organized means whereby all can restrain those who would break it is no peace.

It is just such pinches of salt that must be taken with every peace proposal that may be advanced.

It would be a moral crime against mankind for people of any country to refuse to consider honestly and hopefully weigh every proposal looking to the war's end; but peace proposals are often gift horses requiring the most minute oral inspection.


