Harriman To Head Moscow Mission

WASHINGTON. (AP.)-President Roosevelt disclosed Friday he would appoint W. Averell Harriman head of an American delegation which will go to Moscow to consider the problem of aid to Russia.

Harriman has been in London handling lease-lend operations, and Mr Roosevelt said John Biggers, who has been in charge of production for the Office of Production Management, would take ever Harriman's duties in the British capital.

The delegation to Moscow, which will meet with corresponding British and Russian groups, may be appointed within a few days, the President told a press con ference, and may have a half dozen members.
