and taught the Indians how to amuse themselves with them centuries ago. The old gaming sticks used by the Indians had symbols in four directions. Modern playing cards may have been developed in Asia from the same type of gaming sticks.

After our visit to Taos we returned to Santa Fe. Again our foursome spent the evening playing rubber bridge. Today's hand, played by Mrs. Albert Rockwell, was the most interesting of the evening. The powerful North-South cards did not very well avoid reaching at least six spades. Yet, because of the identical pattern on both sides, with consequent absence of any ruffing value, the contract seemed hopeless.

Mrs. Rockwell, nevertheless, found a way to make the contract. She cashed two trumps, two diamonds, two hearts, and led the third heart. She did not care which opponent got in the lead. So long as the queen and jack of clubs were divided, she was bound to avoid the loss of a club trick by the forced club return.

Warneke Hurls No Hit Game Boosting Cards

St. Louis Passes Dodgers In Torrid Senior Flag Chase

CINCINNATI (AP)—Lean Lon Warneke threw "a little of everything" Saturday in hurling a masterful no-hitter against the Cincinnati Reds and pitching the St. Louis Cardinals into first place in the torrid National League pennant race.

Only three Reds reached first base as the 31-year-old right-hander, veteran of 11 major league campaigns, blanked the world champs, 2-0. The Cards' victory shoved them into first place with a .640 percentage to 638 for Brooklyn, which lost to New York 4-3, and 5-1.

It was the first no-hitter in either major league this season. Only 28 men faced the six-foot Arkansas "hurler," who received a rousing ovation when he got Third Baseman Billy Werber to pop to Johnny Mize near first for the final out. It was Warneke's 15th victory against seven losses for the year.

All that spoiled his magnificent work was a walk in the seventh to Lonnie Frey, a high throw by Creepy Crespi on Frank McCormick's grounder in the fifth, and Jimmy Brown's miff of Jimmy Gleeson's short fly in the eighth.

The Cards themselves were having no bed of roses. Young Elmer Riddle moved them down almost with the same ease as did Warneke. He allowed five hits, two of them scratches.

The crowd of nearly 10,000 was pulling for Warneke from the sixth inning on, when it appeared he might make it.

Warneke toiled on as the tension rose. Occasionally some Red got a long drive—but the Cards were doing and doing that Lon might grab his first no-hitter. They stopped almost everything and some balls were tagged for green pastures.
